Torrance Adventists Attend Area Conference

The four day meet opens today in Long Beach.

Conference to the five-day western states church session. Some 360 official delegates representing 80,000 Adventist church members is California, Arizona, Utah, Nevada and Hawaii will attend the session.

Pastor Metcalf's duties at the session will include serving on various committees charged with selecting top western states leaders of the Seventh-day Adventist Church, and voting on all officials of the church's Pacific Union Conference for the next four-year period. County Health Dept. Adds Pre-Natal Care to Services

Medical care for mothers-to-be who cannot afford private supervision is now available from the Los Angeles County Health Department's Avalon Village, on 231st St., near Avalon Blvd., according to Dr. P. R. Auriemma, district health officer.

The expectant mothers are instructed by the public health nurse on such subjects as hygiene of pregnancy, labor, and delivery, care of the newborn infant, layettes, baby baths and the preparation of formulas.

This new service is an addition to the child health conferences of "baby clinics" held at the health center.

Appointments for pre-natal care must be made in advance by calling NEMark

9-6010, Ext. 333. Prospective patients are asked to telephone first.

The medical and health supervision provided includes the services of a physician, public health nurse, and social case worker. A volunteer from the community, Mrs. William Doyle, assists as needed.

Physical examinations, immunizations, diagnostic tests and health instructions are given by a licensed obstetrician.

Supervision of mothers-to-be should begin as early as possible from their private physician, said Dr. Auriemma. When patients are not able to afford private medical care, the county health department is ready to assist them, he said.

County Okays Barrier to Salt Water

The first unit of a program to halt sea water coming into coastal water wells is scheduled to begin next month.

Nearly six miles of water pipeline, a pressure reducing station and a chlorination plant will be constructed as part of the contract.

The pipeline will start on El Segundo Blvd. some 3,000 feet westerly of Aviation Blvd and run southerly approximately 1.7 miles to Marine Ave. in the City of Manhattan Beach said Supervisor Burton W. Chace.

From this point it continues 1.5 miles along Redondo Ave. to Artesia Blvd at the boundary of the city of Redondo beach. The line then runs an additional 2.7 miles in portions of Axyntey, Grant and Harbness Ave., Anita and Prospect Streets to Torrance Blvd.
