Little Company of Mary Pays \$1,031,550 in Salaries

The contributions that a hospital makes to the community in terms of medical service, peace of mind, advancements in human knowledge, and emergency aid are quite well known.

At Little Company of Mary Hospital last year there were 7209 patients which took advantage of its services.

There were 1692 new lives begun in the maternity rooms, and 5932 emergency patients were given attention.

so often mentioned.


For instance, the Little Company of Mary Hospital infused into the economic life stream of the community last year \$1,031,550 in payroll alone.

Plus that the hospital purchased the following amounts of various commodities:

- 15,330 gallons of milk and cream.
- 7665 loaves of bread.
- 6000 suckers.
- 2100 light bulbs
- 650 giant cans of cleanser.
- 2376 gallons of ice cream.
- And other items too numerous to mention.

The second is the hospital X-Ray Department training program in x-ray technology. The program is of two years duration and, upon completion, students are eligible for registration as X-Ray Technicians. Enrollment is open to single, female high school graduates between the ages of 18-25. Further information may be obtained by contacting the hospital Radiology Department.

The role of Little Company of Mary Hospital in the nursing program is to provide the students with an area for clinical experience which will correlate their theory and practice.

One is a program of training in laboratory technology. Technologist trainees are currently undergoing a program in the hospital laboratory.

Successful completion of the program will qualify the students to write the California State examination as laboratory technologists.

Students are **Mary Ann Kovach**, of Torrance, who completed her prerequisite college training at the University of Pittsburgh,

The third educational program is the hospital's affiliation with the Nursing Program at El Camino College. In September, students in the El Camino program began their clinical training at the hospital.

The nursing program, which is two years in length, will prepare the students for the same licensing examination as that taken by graduates of three and four year nursing programs. Satisfactory completion of the examination will result in

He is a member of the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology, and assistant clinical professor at UCLA.


Others on the medical staff include:
