

# Boswell Files for Reelection To Board of Education

William C. Boswell, member of the Board of Education of the Torrance Unified School District, has announced that he is filing for re-election in the April 16 election.

"Five years of experience on the board, and the educational philosophy I represent, should continue to benefit the community," said Boswell.

He added that the accomplishments of the board, with his assistance, are "in the record," and, said Boswell, are consistent with the wishes of the voters.

Among those accomplishments, Boswell listed: graded report cards at elementary level; departmentalization in the 7th and 8th grades; hiring teachers with subject matter majors; improved academic standards; vigilance over expenditures to obtain more education for each tax dollar; worked for beneficial and opposed detrimental state legislation; and added schools and classrooms with student population increase.

Boswell said that maintaining and improving those accomplishments are his aims. He cited other areas for expansion, including reducing class sizes to cut teacher load; additional vocational courses; libraries for elementary schools, and improvements in 7th and 8th grade physical education.

## Little Babies Lead the Move Into New Harbor Hospital

Saturday, Feb. 23, will be Moving Day for approximately 450 patients in Los Angeles County Harbor General Hospital in Torrance.

It will make the long-awaited move into the new \$15,400,000 Acute Unit and Outpatient Clinic dedicated Jan. 14, at Carson St. and Vermont Ave.

The distance from the extreme westerly building of the old facility to the new admitting area is approximately one-half mile.

The move started last week with the transport of a 2700-pound IBM machine and nearly 7000 lineal feet of patient chart shelving from the old Army barracks units to the modern building.

The move originally was scheduled, Jan. 26, but unscheduled delays in installations and mechanical failures, forced A. L. Thomas, administrator, to hold back the "green" light until this weekend.

Although such divisions as the medical library, employees cafeteria and main kitchen, chart files, auxiliary offices, and pharmacy have been installed in the new areas, patient care units will be moved during the weekend.

Friday is a holiday so the clinics, normally closed on holidays and weekends, will be the first patient care areas to be vacated.

No patients will be involved in this transfer.

The patients will be moved from the World War II Port of Embarkation Hospital at six o'clock Saturday morning.

First, will be the premature babies. They will move in incubators.

Then will follow mothers,

babies in bassinets, pediatric patients and adults. Emergency patients will be the last moved.

The new hospital is scheduled to receive emergency patients, such as traffic accident victims by noon Saturday.

Under direction of Mrs. Marguerite Broen McAllister, the adult auxiliary, volunteers for Children, and the teenage "Candy Strippers," have been assisting.

Five area ambulance companies are volunteering personnel and equipment in the patient move. They are the South Bay, Millers, Goodhue, and Bowers Ambulance

Companies and the California Ambulance Service.

When the move is completed, patient visitors may use the northeast corner area adjoining the building for parking. There is room for 200 automobiles. Clinic patient parking is provided in the north west area facing Carson. The admitting area is reached through the Carson gatehouse direct to the doors under the colonnades.

The new hospital and clinics, replace the 101 buildings erected on the old Spanish Land Grant site by the Army during World War II and sold to the county in 1946.


