


Our Readers Send Pictures,

## Trustees Write New Rules For Favored Golf Course

Suppressed anger burst into the open last night at City Council with the growing realization that in the choice of a site for the new South Coast College there seems to be two sets of rules — one for Torrance and another for politically favored Fox Hills Golf Course.

A public hearing on the golf course as a site for the new college has been set for tomorrow in a surprise move by the Board of Trustees of the California State Colleges.

At the Council, the fact that the Board required an area of more than 300 acres for a Torrance site, yet is considering a site of only 100 acres on the Fox Hills Golf Course brought angry cries of "political sabotage" and "breach of faith."

The significance of the difference in areas lies in the fact that an alleged oil recovery cost of \$4.2 million is a major stumbling block to locating the college in Torrance.

With a 100-acre site in Torrance, relocation of oil wells would not be necessary.

The Fox Hills Golf Course is said to be favored by politically powerful Jesse Unruh, speaker of the state assembly.

siderable support from neighboring cities as the ideal site for the college.

The city of Rolling Hills has bolstered the case for Torrance by spurning the idea of locating the college on the Palos Verdes Peninsula.

Torrance is the only city in the area actively seeking and wanting the college.

The final decision lies with the Board of Trustees, meeting tomorrow and Friday in Sacramento.

A delegation of city officials and citizens from Torrance will attend to present the city's case.

## Board Chooses 15-Acre Site Of New School

The Board of Education of Torrance Unified School District last Monday night chose a 15-acre site south of 229th St. as the home of the new elementary school in the Marble Estate development.

The vote was unanimous with Vice President Bert M. Lynn in the chair in the absence of President Albert W. Charles.

A verbal commitment was given by Ray Watt, one of the developers of the huge \$30 million project, that the land could be purchased by the board for not more than \$26,000 per acre.

The resolution of the board instructed the school administration to take steps to condemn the property owned by the Santa Fe Railroad, if necessary.
