## Red Cross Opens Fund Drive

The first two campaigns in the 1963 Red Cross appeal in Torrance for support of the organization's increasing community activities went in full swing March 1.

General Fund Chairman Bob Levelen said that a complete survey of the business makeup of Torrance has resulted in assignment of accounts to those volunteers most likely to make successful contacts.

"We've been asked to raise \$8700 as this city's share in the overall Los Angeles Chapter quota of \$3,386,882. I'm determined we can do a good job of it."

Keith H. Pischel, assistant vice president and manager of Pacific State Bank, will lead the commerce and industry solicitation.

"Torrance is recognized as an outstanding industrial center," said Pischel. "We have a goal of \$2500, but I'm sure we'll be reporting over that figure before the campaign is very many days along."

He has worked on other group drives in this area.

Pischel, his wife, Sharon, and children, Greg and Lory, reside at 24105 Nordman in Lomita.

A well-known local restaurant owner, Charley Gotts, has organized the

small business drive for Red Cross.

"I really feel great about this year's campaign," he said. "We all know and appreciate Red Cross services. I'm sure our business community will back us solidly."

Gotts, who has been in business in Torrance for 19 years, has a wife, son, three daughters—and 11 grandchildren. He has asked representatives of a number of special groups within the general small business classification to make the Red Cross appeal this year.

Levelen, who was the successful small business chairman for the 1962 Red Cross drive, is a lieutenant colonel in the National Guard Reserve and coordinator of the Torrance Armed Forces Day.

"I've lived here in Torrance since 1923. I'm proud of our all-American city. There are many more like myself who will make this our best Red Cross campaign," he declared.
