Notice is hereby given that the Board of Supervisors hereby invites sealed proposals or bids for the construction of sanitary sewers in County Improvement No. 2216, 216th Street (A Private Street) and other rights of way in accordance with the terms and provisions of the Resolution of Intention adopted by the Board on the 15th day of January, 1963, and the plans and specifications therefor which are filed in the aforementioned office of said Board.

Said proposals, or bids, will be received by the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors at the Public Counter, Room 500, Los Angeles County Engineering Building, 108 West 2nd Street, Los Angeles 12, California, until 9:00 a.m. on Friday, the 29th day of March, 1963, and will be opened, examined and declared by the County Engineer on the same day in the County Engineer Hearing Room, Room 100 in said Los Angeles County Engineering Building.

The proceedings for the aforesaid improvement are under and in accordance with an Act of the Legislature of the State of California known and designated as Division 7 of the Streets and Highways Code (Improvement Act of 1931), and the bonds to be issued to pay the costs and expenses thereof as provided in said Resolution of Intention will also be issued in accordance with the provisions of said Act.

Proposals must be submitted on the blank forms prepared and furnished for the purpose and which may be obtained at the Office of the County Engineer, Room 103 of said Los Angeles County Engineering Building. At said office bidders may also obtain copies of the plans, profiles and specifications for the contemplated improvement upon deposit of \$5.00 per set, such deposit will be refunded if the plans, profiles and specifications so obtained are returned in good condition to said Room 103, Los Angeles County Engineering Building, within fourteen days after opening of bids.

Each submitted proposal must be accompanied by a check certified by a responsible bank, or by a bond, payable to the County of Los Angeles, in a sum equivalent to at least ten (10) per cent of the total aggregate amount of the bid, as a guarantee that the bidder, if his proposal be accepted, will enter into and execute the awarded contract, and furnish the required bonds in connection therewith, in accordance with the terms of the aforementioned specifications. It is further guaranteed that the bidder and a duly authorized corporate surety acceptable to the Board of Supervisors.

PREVAILING WAGE SCHEDULE

Pursuant to the provisions of the Labor Code of the State of California, the Board of Supervisors has ascertained the prevailing rates of per diem wages in dollars, based on a working day of eight hours, for each craft or type of workman or mechanic as specified in the proposed contract under these specifications; and it will be required that not less than said rates be paid to all such workmen or mechanics employed or engaged upon the work.

The rates of per diem wages for each of the various classifications of work shall be the hereinafter set forth prevailing rates of hourly wages plus the hourly equivalent of any employer payments for health and welfare, pension, vacation and similar purposes multiplied by eight. Eight hours shall constitute a day's work; it being understood that in the event that workmen are employed less than eight hours per day, their per diem wages shall be determined to be that fraction of the per diem wages herein established that the number of hours of employment bears to eight hours.

The contractor shall, as a penalty to the County of Los Angeles, forfeit ten dollars for each calendar day, or portion thereof, for each workman paid less than the stipulated prevailing rates for any work done under the contract by him, or by any subcontractor under him.

Provided that overtime rates, rate of pay for Saturdays, Sundays and holidays shall apply to those holidays as recognized in the collective bargaining agreements applicable to the particular craft, classification or type of workman employed on the project.

Provided that notwithstanding the general provisions contained herein, Carrels and Watchmen shall be paid one and one-half times the prevailing rate for overtime (overtime shall be time worked in excess of eight hours per day or forty hours per week), and the straight prevailing rate for time worked on Saturdays, Sundays and where such time does not constitute overtime.

APPRENTICES—May be employed in conformity with Section 1777.5 of the California Labor Code.

RIGGERS—Same wage scale as craft to which rigging is incidental.

WELDERS—Same wage scale as craft to which welding is incidental.

FOREMEN—All foremen not herein separately classified shall be paid not less than 25 cents per hour more than the hourly equivalent of the daily rate of the highest classification in which he has supervision in the six Basic Trades.

OPERATING ENGINEERS: Health and Welfare — 15c per hour. Pension — 10c per hour. Vacation Pay — 10c per hour.

Engineer-Operator and Signaller: \$3.655. Air compressor, pump or generator operator: \$3.655. Boring machine operator: \$4.245.

Pavement breaker operator: \$4.435. Roller operator, compacting: \$4.245. Tractor operator — boom attachments: \$4.635.

Trenching machine operator (Up to 6-foot depth capacity, manufacturer's rating): \$4.245. Trenching machine operator (Over 6-foot depth capacity, manufacturer's rating): \$4.635.

Universal equipment operator (shovel, back hoe, dragline, derrick,errick barge, clamshell, crane, pile driver and mucking machine): \$4.635.

Concrete or asphalt spreading, mechanical (all types and sizes), soil, cement asphalt-finish (all types and sizes): \$4.435. A-frame or winch truck operator: \$4.135.

Power concrete saw operator: \$4.135. Skid loader, wheel type — Ford, Ferguson, Jeep or similar type 3/4 yard or less (Without dragtype attachments): \$3.895.

Skid loader — wheel type — over 3/4 yard, up to and including 1 1/2 yards: \$4.435. Road oil mixing machine operator: \$4.435.

Power sweeper operator: \$4.245. Tractor operator — dragtype shovel, bulldozer, tamper, scraper and push tractor: \$4.435.

Note: All classifications employed in a tunnel will receive 25 cents per hour premium pay in addition to the regular rate of pay.

PROP. TRAVEL: Health and Welfare — 4% of gross payroll. Pension Plan — 5% of gross payroll. Vacation and Holidays — 7 1/2% of gross payroll.

Plumber: \$4.53. Health and Welfare — 15c per hour. Pension — 5c per hour.

Driver of truck, legal payload capacity: Health and Welfare — 10c per hour. Less than 4 tons: \$3.72. 4 tons to 10 tons: \$3.75.

Driver of Dump Truck of less than: 4 yards water level: \$3.72. 4 yards but less than 8 yards water level: \$3.75.


Driver of road oil spreader trucks: \$3.90. Driver of Water Tank Truck: \$3.74.

The necessity for the use of an employee as a Signaller shall be determined by the Contractor. When used, he shall be an Engineer-Operator who assists in giving or relaying signals by mechanical means (also by means of hand signals on excavation work) directly to the Operator of hoisting equipment only.

APPRENTICE SCHEDULE: The apprentice rate is by percentage of the journeyman's rate. Interval 1st 2nd 3rd 4th 5th 6th 7th 8th 9th 10th.

Beckley and Stone Mason: 50 60 70 80 90 95. Cement Mason: 6 months 60 67 74 81 88 95. Plumber: 6 months 54 55 62 69 76 83 90 96 99.

The rate of compensation for any classification not listed in the schedule, but which may be required to execute the proposed contract, shall be commensurate and in accord with the rates specified for similar and comparable classification or for those performing similar or comparable duties.


