Sabin Vaccine To Be Given Here Tomorrow

The staff of the Torrance Health Center has volunteered to sponsor a makeup Sabin oral polio clinic at the Health Center, 2300 W. Carson St., Torrance, according to Dr. E. W. Kendrick, district health officer.

A donation of 25 cents will be asked to help pay for the vaccine. Free vaccine will be available for persons unable to pay. Type I Sabin oral polio vaccine is scheduled for tomorrow, Thursday, March 21 from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. Sabin vaccine is given on a sugar cube. Persons who cannot have sugar will be given sugar-free solutions. Type III is scheduled for May 2 and Type II for June 13.

ACID LOVING PLANTS

When the acid loving plants — abalea, camellia and rhododendron — go out of bloom, it is time for the gardener to begin feeding them with an acid fertilizer.

Income Tax Q. and A.

QUESTION: Are the exemptions for state income tax purposes the same as Federal?

ANSWER: While the exemption of \$600 for each dependent is the same for state and federal tax purposes, the requirements for claiming a dependent is generally less restrictive under the state law.

The deduction is allowable under the California law without regard to the dependent's income, age, educational status, or the fact that the dependent files his own return, provided the taxpayer is related to the dependent and actually furnishes over half of the dependent's support.

A single taxpayer is allowed a personal exemption of \$1500 and a married couple an exemption of \$3000 for State purposes. These exemptions compare to the regular Federal exemption of \$600 for a taxpayer or the \$1200 exemption allowed a taxpayer and his wife filing a joint return. California does not allow an additional exemption for taxpayers over 65. The exemption of \$600 for a blind taxpayer is the same under both the state and Federal laws.

Anti-Smog Device Test

California has accepted a seventh exhaust device for official testing.

Dr. J. B. Askew, San Diego, Motor Vehicle Pollution Control Board chairman, said that a catalytic-type muffler developed by Ethyl Corp. will be road tested as soon as prototypes can be received.
