Traffic Rules Adopted for Seven Streets

The Board of Supervisors has adopted traffic regulations affecting seven streets in the Palos Verdes-Rolling Hills area, according to Supervisor Burton W. Chace.

New regulations soon to be enforced, Chace said, include a 45-mile-an-hour speed limit on Hawthorne Blvd. between Silver Spur Road and Rolling Hills Estates; a new boulevard stop sign for motorists entering Grayslake Road from Mossbank, Finecast, Waukesha and Clint, and clockwise traffic will be discontinued around Bramante Place.

The new regulations, Supervisor Chace said, are required to meet conditions caused by new construction and heavier traffic flow in the area.
