Temple Group Studies Talmud

Temple Menorah, 1101 Camino Real, Redondo Beach, is currently holding a weekly discussion group on Sunday mornings as a part of its adult education program.

Purpose of the discussions is to study and discuss various aspects of Judaism, as a religion and as a way of life.

According to Dr. Leonard Cole, chairman of the discussion group, the approach is an informal one, under the guidance of lay people. Rabbi Henri Front, and Max Rauch, director of education, give professional assistance.

At the present time, under the guidance of Carl Pearlson, the group is making inquiry into an introduction to the Talmud, that segment of the Hebrew sacred writings second in importance only to the Holy Scriptures.

'Matter' Is Sun. Topic

A Bible lesson on the subject of "Matter" will be read this Sunday at First Church of Christ, Scientist, Torrance.

Among the many Scriptural selections, will be this citation from II Corinthians (5:8): "We are confident, I say, and will rather be absent from the body, and to be present with the Lord."

Other passages will bring out the Christian Science teaching that all matter is a "graven image," a temporary, limited, delusive sense of things that must finally give way before the consciousness of ultimate, spiritual reality created by God.

A Letter to Russia . . .

CLARK AND KRUSHCHEV

(Eighth of a series)

Dear Ivan:

U.S. history is a rewarding textbook for those who wish to change the world. In the record of America, there are two such attempts. One, a revolution of freedom, was successful. The other, a revolution of slavery, was a failure.

The first was the Declaration of Independence which was made a reality by the Revolution and the War of 1812. The second was the secession from the Five Truths of the Declaration by the slave states, which failed in Civil War.

In the Revolution, George Rogers Clark showed how to isolate and to conquer the greatest power on earth. The British efforts to quell the Revolution of freedom in North America hinged largely upon the Indians. Clark had 175 men in a wilderness peopled by Indians who far outnumbered him. He knew that he had only to keep the Indians neutral to win.

While Clark's men surrounded the British fort at Vincennes, a party of British Indians returned with scalps and other spoils of war. Clark lined them up in front of the fort and bashed in their skulls.

Clark turned to the uncommitted Indians who outnumbered him and said, in effect, "see, the greatest power on earth cannot protect its own. What can it do for you?"

Clark tossed a belt of war and a belt of peace upon the ground and gave the Kickapoos their choice. The Indians chose peace, and the western border of the infant U.S. vaulted from the Alleghenies to the Mississippi.

In much the same way, your leader Khrushchev disrupted the so-called Summit Conference of 1960 and, in Paris, humiliated an American President in front of the uncommitted peoples of the world.

Then, he turned and, in effect, said, "see, the greatest power on earth cannot protect its own. What can it do for you?"

In a life and death struggle, such as Clark's in 1778 and ours today, no one can be neutral. India is tasting the bitter dregs of the delusion of neutrality, just as Czechoslovakia and other nations did earlier. The Indians of India are discovering the price of neutrality today, just as the Indians of North America discovered it more than a century ago.

Those who wish to preserve their way of life cannot be passive bystanders in a life and death struggle. They, if they truly wish to

survive, must join the struggle on the side that is most favorable to them.

The aspirations of the people of the world naturally are directed to their own individual freedom. The lesson of India dramatically shows whose ideas—those of your government, or those of the hope and the promise of the Declaration of Independence—most favor individual and national freedom.

The leaders of India have shown that one stands neutral at the peril of death—just as the Indians of North America doomed their way of life by standing neutral in 1778.

In this struggle—the third great challenge to the hope and the promise of the Declaration of Independence—it is a simple truth that those who are not with us are against us. Do you, in your heart, desire individual freedom? If so, where should you stand?

Double Honors For Mushrush

Lehr Mushrush, North High School's speech instructor, has received double honors. He has been awarded a Diamond Key Award by the National Forensic League and granted a sabbatical leave by the Torrance Unified School District's board of education.

MUSHrush who received the Diamond Key Award for earning 14,000 National Forensic League speech points, has been the speech coach at North High for seven years.

Of the approximately fifty coaches in the nation who have received the honor of wearing diamond keys, Mushrush is the fifth in the Los Angeles, Orange and Ventura counties.
