1. What Would Your Primary Objective Be If Elected to the Board? My primary objective, if elected to the school board, will be a desire to serve the children of the community to see that all get the best education possible within the limitations of the dollars available.

I will try to accomplish this through close cooperation with the administrative employees of the board, who have professional knowledge, yet be strong in forming policy for the administration to follow.

2. How Do You Think a School Board Member Can Promote Improvements in the Following Areas of Education:

(A) Curriculum. In my opinion a school board should be aware of the needs of the community in relation to education adaptable to the society in which we live.

The continuation and advancement of more basic skills such as reading, spelling and arithmetic, especially at elementary school level, which are the tools for learning for higher and specific fields.

(B) Obtaining and Retaining a High Caliber of Teachers. The dedicated teacher is the most important aspect of a good school system.

I would encourage teachers to participate in their professional groups. I approve of financial remuneration for advanced study in their major fields.

The board should maintain a teacher salary schedule comparative to other districts; should offer, within budget limitation, aids and equipment to do a more effective job which will help to a result of personal satisfaction of accomplishment.

School administration liaison with college placement bureaus will help to get good teachers.

(C) Budget Allotments. The budget allotment should be made only after close study and evaluation by the board.

Evaluation should be made in regard to priorities that are set by the administrative staff and board's awareness of results attained by a comparative basis.

(D) Summer School Program. Summer school program should be encouraged to give students an opportunity to make up work or to take subjects that will

3. What Means Do You Favor for Financing New School Construction? I favor the selling of bonds as authorized by the people and administered by the school board as the best way to finance our new construction.

Due to our anticipated future growth and increase in assessed valuation, the tax load can better be distributed through future payments rather than by a "pay as you go" basis.


