

Annual Torrance School Science Fair Comes to Town; Visitors Invited Friday

Torrance science students are displaying their exhibits during the Annual Science Fair currently being held at South High School. The show began April 23 and continues through Friday April 26.

Several hundred individual and group projects are displayed representing the biological and physical sciences at both the elementary and senior high level.

Participating in the fair are 32 Torrance elementary schools with three exhibits each and the four high schools, each with 15 exhibits. The public may view the display April 26 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. and 7 to 8 p.m. in the South High School gymnasium, 4801 Pacific Coast Highway. Judging will take place April 25 with awards to be given in the following divisions: Grades 1-4, 5-6, 7-8-9, 10-12.

Art Festival To Be Held Next Month
