Bert Lynn Attends Denver Conference of School Boards

Some 5000 school board members from all sections of the nation, including Bert M. Lynn from the Torrance Unified School District, met in Denver, Colo., for the 23rd annual convention of the National School Boards Association.

Theme of this year's meeting is "School Boards In A Changing Society" and speakers are slated to cover the full range of school problems from keeping abreast of the latest developments in teaching techniques and school design to finding adequate financial resources to pay the skyrocketing bills for modern education.

Coming in for special attention will be the matter of teacher - superintendent-board relations. A special NSBA committee has been exploring this subject since last fall and will present its report and a proposed resolution to the Delegate Assembly, the association's official policy making body. The committee has reaffirmed NSBA's existing policy on the subject and urges local boards of education to establish clearly defined policies for guiding their relations with employees.

Convention keynoter will be George McGhee, undersecretary of state for political affairs and newly appointed ambassador to West Germany. His talk will deal with the many political changes taking place in the world around us and what

strengthening and preserving local lay responsibility for education so that it produces the kind of education needed for a changing world.

The NSBA is a federation of the 50 state school boards associations, and is the national voice for the nation's more than 100,000 school board members. Through its membership, the Association is responsible for the education of 95 percent of the nation's public elementary and secondary school students.

E. C. College Debaters Are Ready to Talk

Three members of the El Camino College forensics squad will compete in the Tournament of Champions Saturday at Long Beach State College.

This marks the first time that two-year colleges have been invited to compete against representatives of four-year colleges and universities in Southern California in what was formerly titled the Tournament of Pears.

Claudia Wilkens of Torrance and Steve Winer will compete in women's oral interpretation and men's oral interpretation, respectively.

Ramon Diaz will face opponents in a debate method patterned after the Lincoln-Douglas debates in which Stephen Douglas defended slavery and defeated Abraham Lincoln for election as the U.S. Senator from Illinois. A shortened form of the original style will be used.

Diaz earned the right to represent El Camino College when he defeated fellow squad member Mike Hohn in a debate on the El Camino College campus.

Chosen winner by an audience of students, Diaz debated the negative side on the national college debate topic: Resolved, that the non-Communist nations of the world should form an economic community. This same topic will be argued at the Long Beach tournament.

"There are some strong representatives from other colleges entering, so the competition will be far from dull," Jerry Borden, coach of the El Camino forensics team, predicted.

Course Offered in English as 2nd Language

"English As A Second Language," a new two-semester course will be added to the El Camino College curriculum in the fall semester of 1963, Harry Ruby, assistant director of instruction, division of humanities, announced this week.

Designed for students with foreign language backgrounds and to whom English is a second language, the course will provide instruction in pronunciation, grammar, sentence structure, reading and composition.

Instruction for the second semester will emphasize vocabulary building, word study and reading based on a 4,000 word vocabulary.

Officially labeled English C1 and C2 in the college bulletin, the course will be offered in both day and night classes and will meet for three hours per week each semester.

Hahn Assails County Budget

Preliminary 1963-64 County presented the Board of Supervisors this week by the Chief Administrative Officer has been termed "way out of line" by supervisor Kenneth Hahn.

The budget proposes a \$66,556,798 increase in the general fund requirements over 1962-63 — an increase of 10.87 per cent. Last year's general fund budget totaled \$612,066,588 and the new proposed budget requires \$678,623,386.

If supervisors do not substantially cut the proposed budget, a 23 cents per \$100

assessed valuation increase in the tax rate will result. The new budget calls for a tax rate of \$2.3102, as compared to the current \$2.0818. Hahn said: "The budget presented by the Chief Administrative Officer is too high. It must be slashed. "I will not vote for it in its present form. "The power to tax is the power to destroy," Hahn added, pointing out that taxpayers are already overburdened and government officials should be looking for ways to cut taxes, not increase them.
