Spiritual Awakening Called Key to Health

Spiritual awakening opens the door to joyous, healthy, abundant living, Sylvia N. Poling of Phoenix, Arizona, told an audience in Torrance, Thursday, May 2.

This awakening, she said, always comes through prayer based on a scientific understanding of God and man.

A Christian Science teacher and practitioner, Miss Poling is on nationwide tour as a member of The Christian Science Board of Lectureship. She spoke in the church edifice at 218th St. and Manuel Ave. under the auspices of First Church of Christ, Scientist, Torrance.

Maxine Babb, the second reader, introduced her.

In her lecture entitled "Christian Science Reveals the Door to Life More Abundant," Miss Poling explained the practical significance of Christ Jesus' statements: "I am the door" (John 10:7) and "I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly" (John 10:10).

The door referred to by Jesus was not his material personality, but the Christ, "that is, the nature of God, or the truth of spiritual being which he taught and proved by his healing works," she declared.

Miss Poling described life more abundant in terms of the kingdom of heaven, pointing out that it is possible here and now to experience the kingdom of heaven in some degree.

The lasting harmony associated with the word heaven is gained, she said, through spiritual understanding of the true nature of God and man — and through putting this understanding into practice.

She declared that "we enter the kingdom of heaven not by going to a place, but by our willingness to learn more of God. In other words,
