

EL CAMINO ALUMNI PLAY KEY CIVIC ROLES

Seven alumni of El Camino College are honored in the first edition of the college's new campus magazine, "Warrior Life," for their achievements in the fields of business, education, industry and dentistry.

All of the alumni are active in their respective professions in the South Bay area.

Wayne Clifford, an alumnus of the first graduating class at El Camino is among the magazine's selection as outstanding graduates; he is now engaged in the space

industry. **Personnel Man** Clifford, who began his college education at ECC and transferred to Stanford to complete his formal education, is a personnel manager with the Garrett Air Research Corporation.

In the field of advertising "Warrior Life" selected Lynne Frantz, promotion manager for the South Bay Center in Redondo Beach, as an outstanding example of what can be accomplished with an associate of arts degree.

Frantz was a journalism

major at El Camino, editor in chief of the weekly Warwhoop, president of the Associated Students and a member of the 1952 graduating class. He was also active in athletics and set a record in the high jump which stood until last year.

Civic Leader Today Frantz is engaged in numerous community affairs. He is president of the Redondo Community Chest, campaign chairman of the YMCA, past president of the Redondo Junior Chamber of Commerce, a director of the Boy Scouts and a member of Kiwanis.

Dr. Leroy G. Groves, a graduate of the class of 1949, represents the dental profession. Dr. Groves attended Occidental College and the University of Southern California following El Camino College days.

While at ECC Dr. Groves was active in football, baseball and basketball. He states that the education he received at El Camino was "excellent in both instruction and curriculum."

Hal Thompson and his wife Marlene, both alumni of El Camino, are the owners of a successful trophy and engraving business in

the South Bay-Centinel area.

Barest of Capital Mr. and Mrs. Thompson started their business with a minimum amount of capital with their initial facilities literally in their own backyard.

Majoring in engineering and design, Thompson graduated from ECC in 1957. Mrs. Thompson attended the college in 1955-1956, and majored in business.

In the field of education, "Warrior Life" honored Ken Swearingin and Miss Virginia Pfiffner, both instructors at their alma mater.

Swearingin is a physical education instructor and head coach of the El Camino football team, rated sixth in the nation by the All-American Grading Index with a 8-2 record last year.

Teachers at ECC Miss Pfiffner, a graduate of the class of 1950, is a psychology instructor at El Camino. She received her bachelor's degree from Occidental College and recently obtained a master's degree from USC.

All the alumni, according to the magazine, feel the junior college is an important part of the educational system in California.

Aeronca Boss Gets 25-Year Firm Award

National recognition for more than 25 years of outstanding service to the aviation industry was given to Aeronca Manufacturing Corporation recently at Dallas, Texas.

Receiving the silver medal for Aeronca from the Aviation and Space Writers Assn. was J. P. Lawler, Aeronca's vice president of marketing. Aeronca was one of 43 companies honored at the association's silver anniversary dinner held in the ballroom of the Adolphus Hotel. The award was presented by Albert Harting, representing the more than 500 aviation and space writers who attended the dinner.

As Lawler received the award for Aeronca, a picture of the Aeronca chief—a light airplane produced by the local firm 25 years ago—was flashed on the giant screen, as a brief history of Aeronca was read. A photograph of a current product, a 60-foot antenna reflector, was shown. This huge antenna dish—made in Middletown, Ohio—was one of two Aeronca-made reflectors used to bounce the first television picture off an orbiting satellite, the Echo.

As a part of the Aeronca presentation, Harting noted that Aeronca has progressed from light airplane production to being a major subcontractor for the moon vehicle, the Apollo. He pointed out Aeronca's leadership in the use of honeycomb and in the electronic and "hot structures" fields of aerospace research and development.
