## Threesome To Attend Confab

Three delegates will represent the Manhattan Beach Branch, American Association of University Women, at the 1963 Association national convention in Denver, Colorado, June 24-28.

Branch representatives will be: Mmes. Ruben E. Jimenez, chairman of the California State Division social and economic issues committee; Norm A. Hessman, branch president-elect; and Raymond Kelly, chairman of the branch status of women committee.

The convention, to be headquartered in the Denver Hilton Hotel, will have as its theme, "A Structure for Our Purpose." Major convention business will center on action on proposals to change the basic structure of the AAUW.

According to Mrs. Jimenez, chairman of the delegation to the five-day conclave, this action on the proposed structural changes will make the 1963 convention of utmost importance in the history of the organization.

The three proposals involve the adoption of a triennium in the place of a biennium for program building and development; a change in the method of AAUW accreditation of colleges and universities, which would result in an increase in the number eligible for membership; and a change in the division of study - action areas, to include education, community problems, world problems, and cultural interests in the future.

If the convention approves the proposals, the Manhattan Beach Branch program for the next triennium will center on theme specific topics: "The American Family in a 'Changing World,'" "Bridging the Gap Between Science and the Layman," "Expectations for Education," and "Occident and Orient."

The meeting will feature addresses by Dr. Anna L. Rose Hawkes, association president; Irene Hilton, president of the International Federation of University

Women; John D. Rockefeller; Edith Green, congresswoman; and Dr. Harrison Brown.

Balloting for officers to lead the 150,000 members of the 1,500 local branches in the United States and Guam will be held. Dr. Blanche H. Dow, president of Cottey College, Nevada, Missouri, is the nominee for the association presidency.

The AAUW Achievement Award will be presented to Dr. Helen B. Thussig, professor of pediatrics, Johns Hopkins University, at the convention.

Study materials and other aids will be exhibited; area sightseeing tours will be provided.
