

Church of Christ Sets Child Psychology Talks

Redondo Beach Church of Christ, 6122 Pacific Coast Highway announces that Mrs. Douglas Trowbridge will present a series of talks on child psychology beginning the first Wednesday in July.

Topics will include: historical and contemporary beliefs regarding child growth and development; principles of effective discipline; motivation and individual differences; and nature of intelligence.

Mrs. Trowbridge obtained her B. A. degree from Pepperdine College where she majored in psychology and minored in history, sociology and home economics.

As an undergraduate, she was elected student body secretary, was a member of the campus scholastic and women's honor societies and a charter member of Psi Chi, national psychological fraternity. She was listed in Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities and upon graduation was selected as the outstanding student in psychology.

Following graduation, Mrs. Trowbridge accepted the position of clinic coordinator for the Pepperdine psychology - speech clinic while she continued her studies in psychology and education.

In the Spring of 1955, Mrs.

Trowbridge obtained her M.A. in clinical psychology from Pepperdine.

The following Fall she began work toward the Ph.D. degree in psychology at Stanford University where she received an appointment as a resident assistant. While at Stanford, Mrs. Trowbridge was selected to receive a Stanford honors fellowship.

While attending Stanford, she met her husband, who is now a practicing attorney in Redondo Beach.

Mrs. Trowbridge is presently continuing her studies toward the Ph.D. degree at the University of Southern California. Prior to the birth of the Trowbridges' child, Mark, she was a school psychologist for the Torrance Unified School District. She is now engaged in private practice, and is Director of Guidance and Counseling for the South Bay Career Women's College.

Mrs. Trowbridge holds the elementary teaching credential, the psychometrist credential, the school psychologist credential and the general pupil personnel credential.

She is certified by the California State Board of Medical Examiners, is an associate member of the American Psychological Association and a member of the Western Psychological Association.

Heart Association Honors Area Women

Less modesty and more information about its many programs quietly combating heart disorders was demanded of the Los Angeles County Heart Association by the more than 350 county volunteer leaders attending the recent first annual conference at the Statler Hilton Hotel. Seven awards were presented at the conference to heart volunteers of the Torrance area.

"Taking the Pulse of Our Community," was theme of the conference which urged aggressive distribution of new research discoveries, reported new findings on cardiac work potential and recognized the many services available to local residents.

"This desire for knowledge shows that more people are becoming aware of the heart problem and, therefore, will help the Heart Association in its work to save lives, relieve suffering and start programs of prevention of heart disease," said Joseph M. Oyster, M.D., outgoing president of the association.

Other needs suggested were: finding a way to combat harmful food fads, accelerating hospital programs for rehabilitation of stroke victims, expanding fund-raising activities to acquire more money for new programs, encouraging participation of various professional groups to help combat heart disease.

Elected president of the association at the Annual Meeting luncheon which followed the morning conference was John L. Denney, M.D., of 1819 Twin Palms Dr., San Marino, assistant medical director of the Los Angeles County General Hospital.

Guest speaker at the luncheon was John D. Brun-

dage chairman of the American Heart Association Board of Directors. He told of the awakening of American businessmen to the need of supporting the Heart Association's work to keep workers on the job with healthy hearts.

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Adventist Church Urges Integration

Some 200 administrators, ministers and other church workers of the Southern California of Seventh-day Adventists heard a major policy statement of their church or race relations Monday.

Gathered at Brookside Park, Pasadena in a policy conference, the church leaders heard Cree Sandefur, Glendale, president of the Southern California Conference of Seventh-day Adventists, present the following statement of policy:

"The Seventh-day Adventist Church takes the firm stand that any member of any race may worship freely in all churches of the denomination in southern California.

"It is recognized that races and nationalities, of their own free choice, may wish to worship in churches composed predominantly of one ethnic group, believing that by so doing they can better serve their own language, racial or cultural group. We believe that such a voluntary fellowship is not related to segregation.

"The Church is opposed to segregation on the basis that it excludes people from the body of Christ due to circumstances which are beyond their control. It is not in harmony with the spirit of the gospel which so clearly teaches the brotherhood of all men.

"In a specific way, the Church seeks:

"At its southern California headquarters it believes in the principle of integration. Persons of several races are currently employed. Future employment in administrative and secretarial levels is projected on need, qualification and overall worth to the very specialized spiritual mission of the Church.

"In its churches throughout the Southland to welcome persons of every race to worship. Numerous church currently have members of different races, all worshipping in fellowship and harmony.

"In its medical institutions to employ in services persons of all races are fully qualified to hold positions in questions. Persons of various races are currently enrolled in schools of nursing;

patients are admitted on the basis of medical need alone.

"In its elementary and secondary schools to enroll students in classes without regard to race.

"The Seventh-day Adventist Church in this area (southern California) will continue to use its influence and example in bringing into reality the oneness of all men that is found in Christ Jesus."

The Church Federation of Los Angeles, through its board of directors, expressed concern over the critical problems of Los Angeles in the area of human relations at a meeting held Tuesday at Church Federation headquarters, according to Dr. Charles S. Kendall, president.

"The Church Federation is anxious to meet the problems of the hour in a thoroughly Christian manner and has arranged to receive a proposal of the Public Affairs Commission at the next meeting of the Board," stated Dr. Kendall.

The commission, under the chairmanship of C. P. Van Herzen, will bring to the board carefully defined proposals for action in areas of housing, employment, education and law enforcement, Kendall added.

A special meeting of the General Assembly of the Federation consisting of delegates from all of the member churches will be held August 5, 1963 at 7:30 p.m. at Wilshire Christian Church, Normandie and Wilshire Boulevards, to discuss and vote on the civil rights proposals.

Bible Lesson To Deal With Science Approach


