MON WINS TOP HONORS AT COLLEGE HERE

M. L. JOSLYN, PHILANTHROPIST, SUCCUMBS AT 90

Marcellus L. Joslyn, industrialist and philanthropist who furnished through the foundation that bears his name half the cost of the Joslyn Adult Recreation Center now under construction in Torrance, was interred this week at private services in Forest Lawn.

Mr. Joslyn, who died Sunday at the age of 90, had been a resident of West Los Angeles for many years, but made his mark in the industrial world in Chicago, where he was founder of the Joslyn Mfg. and Supply Co.,

largest utility supply company in the world.

A founder of the profit-sharing and employe savings plan in 1919, Mr. Joslyn had endowed two adult recreation centers and a bowling green in Santa Monica, and was noted for his support of adult recreation.

He also endowed funds for needy students at Dartmouth, Notre Dame, Pomona College and Harvard Law School.

He is survived by three sons and a daughter, Mrs. Mary J. Curran, of West

GIRL SCOUT CAMP BOOSTED BY HAHN
