## SLATE WORKSHOP

A first for the Bay area, the workshop will be held at the University of California Medical Center in San Francisco, July 18-27, 1963. Dr. Milton Babitz, consultant in parent education, State Department of Education, the workshop staff will include Mrs. Betty Rogoway, parent education supervisor, Palo Alto Unified School

District; Mrs. Ellen Hutzler, parent education teacher, Los Angeles City Schools; Mrs. Leonora H. Gross, home economics supervisor, Stockton City Schools C.C.P.T. representatives will be Mrs. Lesile Wilson of San Jose, director of Parent and Family Education, and the three parent education chairmen—preschool, Mrs. Don McWilliams of Visalia; elementary, Mrs. Jeanada Nolan of Sacramento, and secondary, Mrs. Ray Reese of Vista.

The ten-day training workshop for lay and professional parent education leaders will be designed to give participants:

1. Up-to-date information on the growth, development, psychology, and sociology of children and youth.
2. Training in leadership techniques through demonstration and practice.
3. Opportunity for exchange of information and materials.

Two units of college credit may be earned if desired.

Included in the workshop format will be daily general sessions, and discussion groups divided into three sections—preschool age, elementary school age, and adolescence. Each section will develop its own approach to the workshop subject, and will prepare a summary for presentation at the

Primarily interested in parent education, the C.C.P.T. promotes the leadership training workshops through its scholarship program. During the eight years since their inception in 1954, approximately 300 volunteer have participated in the workshops where they are "Given incentives to accept commitments to promote parent education in their home communities." Of these, two-thirds have received full or partial scholarships from the California Congress of Parents and Teachers. This year, a total of 36 such scholarships, 30 full, six partial, have been granted. Twenty-five of the 33 PTA districts will be represented among the recipients. Total registration is expected to reach the 60 mark.

"This investment of funds," according to Dr. Babitz, "pay substantial dividends in more effective family life for the many thousands of families with whom our PTAs and our public adult schools are able to work."

## TO PLAN STUDIES

Specific studies on questions in the field of public education, and the establishment again, of a mass communications media committee will be among the proposals expected at the meeting of the Board of Managers of the California Congress of Parents and Teachers in Los Angeles, July 10 and 11, 1963. State president, Mrs. W. W. Wood of Marysville, will preside at all general sessions in the Statler Hilton Hotel. Adoption of two house resolutions by the State Assembly calling for interim studies of subjects relating to education, is prompting the request recommended by C.C.P.T. legislative advocate, Mrs. Doyle Hoffman of El Monte, for similar studies by the Board of Manager's education study committee.

HR 212 pertains to the question on the age of admission to kindergarten or first grade; HR 439 focuses on the question of academic freedom of teachers. State Board committee studies would be for the purpose of developing a possible C.C.P.T. statement on each issue. Concern over the subject matter of too many motion

pictures to which children and youth may be exposed accounts for the anticipated recommendation for the appointment of a mass communications media committee. As before the function of this committee would be to study and to alert the C.C.P.T. membership to the existing elements in all phases of mass communications concentrating on specific areas and advising as necessary.

Another probability, spurred on by the defeat of all legislative bills to change the law on the control of pornographic materials, will be recommendation suggested by C.C.P.T. legislative advocate, Mrs. Malcolm H. Finley of San Rafael, for renewed vigor in the promotion of the suggestions on what to do prepared by the former MCM committee for parents, as a basis for an educational campaign to help meet the problem.

Also on the agenda will be the report of the Honorary Life Membership allocations

committee. Recommended will be some overhauling of the 1964-1965 scholarship and fellowship program to omit fellowships in international relations and social work. This would enable an increase in the number of grants where needed most, for teacher education and music scholarships, and special education fellowships for graduate work for students planning to work with youth making transition from school to life situation.

This program continues to grow with the increase in unit, council, and district purchase of Honorary Life Memberships and in donations to the H.L.M. fund as more individuals are honored for their outstanding service to children and youth. Over 6000 H.L.M.s were purchased during the past year according to allocations committee member Mrs. Winston Clare of Los Angeles. In terms of dollars, this represents \$150,000.
