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## 'Borderline Retarded' Pose Challenge to Area Mothers

Editor's Note: The following story was told to this reporter by a Torrance mother who prefers to have her identity undisclosed. The facts are true; but the names have been changed.

Less than a year ago, Mrs. Barker had a problem. Her 10-year-old daughter, Lori, was facing the struggles of a "borderline mentally retarded" child and Mrs. Barker was struggling along with her on her own—seemingly with no place to turn for advice.

She knew Lori was bright enough to be sent to school and she knew there was even hope that some day she might be able to marry.

**Had to Tie Shoelaces**  
 But she didn't know how to help Lori accept her limitations. She looked like any other 10-year-old—but she couldn't do the things they did. Even tying shoelaces was difficult. It was frustrating keeping up with them—and it was hard for them to understand why Lori seemed different.

Mrs. Barker tried to learn all she could about the unique situation of the so-called "educable mentally retarded," but she was stymied. There just wasn't much information available. Ordinary pediatricians and social workers knew little more than she did.

One day the conscientious mother heard a name dropped—the name of somebody who might help. He was a doctor in another city who was connected with an association that was interested in problems of children like Lori. Mrs. Barker wrote to him—and the fruits of the correspondence changed her life.

**Found Link to Others**  
 She learned of the existence in this area of a branch of the National Association for Retarded Children. Six months ago she joined the local group, the Southwest Assn. for Retarded Children Inc.

By meeting other parents in the group and by reading

the special child-rearing materials available through the group, she has found a tie with persons in similar circumstances and has been able to enrich her own experience by sharing theirs.

Problems that seemed unique seem commonplace after talking to a dozen other parents who have faced the same difficulties—and coped with them.

Mrs. Barker told her story to The Press and asked that it be passed along in order that other parents with similar problems who have thought that they were alone might learn of the existence of the Southwest Assn.

**Building Fund**  
 Projects accomplished by the association to date include a program of recreation and physical education in Leona Park set up in conjunction with county parks department, formation of Boy Scout and Girl Scout troops, and establishment of friendship groups for those who have completed training.

From funds donated by member parents and friends, the group is slowly raising a building fund in the hope that there will eventually be a place where parents and children can come for help.

Maximum facilities are needed for an information center where parents can come when they have been told by their doctor that they have a retarded child.

Day care is needed for families with a single parent, or a mother who is ill or must work. Recreational facilities near home are desperately needed, especially in the summer months, to alleviate loneliness.

**Pre-School Needs**  
 Pre-school classes are needed so that training may begin at the earliest possible moment.

A non-profit, sheltered workshop is sought to relieve the financial burden and provide occupation for retarded adults. Finally, it is hoped that dormitories can be built to house those children who otherwise would have to be sent away from home and family for care.

Facilities planned and being worked for by the Southwest Assn. will some day offer doctors and teachers first hand opportunity to increase their working knowledge of the retarded. Nurses, social workers, psychologists and other professionals in our community will be afforded a place to conduct their work under high standards, he concluded.
