

Line Included in Project**

The Guy F. Atkinson Co. of Long Beach is apparent low bidder to construct another link in the 18-mile Dominguez Channel flood control project, Supervisor Burton W. Chace said today. Work will involve construction of a reinforced trapezoidal channel extending for more than a mile-and-a-half along the watercourse, Chace said. Bids ranged to a high of \$4,078,553.

**190th Street
Gets \$35,000
Face Lift**

Supervisor Kenneth Hahn announces an allocation of \$35,000 to assist the city of Torrance in improving 190th St. within the city. The street will be improved between Crenshaw and Arlington Ave. by grading and constructing curb, gutter, roadway base and pavement.

Hahn pointed out that 190th St. is a major county artery and its improvement is of general interest to all South Bay motorists. He noted that this and other allocations to cities represent approximately 42 per cent of the total county highway construction budget. Los Angeles is one of the few counties in the state to provide financial assistance from its gas tax fund. The 1963-64 county budget contemplates subsidies of more than \$18 million for highway programs within cities—up 17 per cent over last year's allocations. This is \$3.30 per capita of incorporated population.

**Torrance
Teams Gain
LL Finals**

Little League playoffs in Districts 26 and 27 neared tomorrow's scheduled playoffs with at least one Torrance area team due to make the Section 6 tournament scheduled here next week.

Torrance National choked off a hot Lomita all-star team last night, 3-2, to enter the District 27 finals. That game will be at Del Amo Field Saturday at 1:30 p.m. against the winner of tonight's 5:30 game at the same field between North Torrance West and North Torrance East.

The latter reached the finals Wednesday night by ousting Torrance American, 7-4.

Lomita had gained last night's semi-finals in a 3-1 win Tuesday over Harbor City.

In District 26, North Redondo, eliminated South Redondo, 3-1, on an eight-inning homer Wednesday to gain the final round. North Redondo had previously ousted Torrance, 6-2.

The District 26 final will be at 1 p. m. Saturday at Riviera Field and will feature North Redondo against winner of last night's Rolling Hills-Malaga Cove contest.

Winners of the two districts will compete next week in a field of 10 district champions in the Section 6 tournament to be directed by John Schnepf. Games will be played at Garrett Field and Mobile Field in Torrance, with the finals Saturday, Aug. 3, at 2 p. m. at Garrett Field.

Torrance National got just three hits off Lomita, all homers, with Mike Abrams' 11th homer of the year providing the winning run.

Daren Von Steeg and Chuck O'Brien also hit circuit blows off Gary Gazely. Lomita's right fielder, Joe Aintablain, walked and forced in Bob Jamison for the only earned run. Catcher Dick Martinez came in on an error for the tying run.

**CHAMBER EYES
NEW PAYROLLS
FOR TORRANCE**

Driving for an expanded industrial base and new payrolls for the city of Torrance, the industrial development committee of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce will undertake immediately a complete and comprehensive survey of all industrial buildings and lands currently available for occupancy or development, it was announced today by Arthur L. Reeves, committee chairman.

Upon completion of the inventory, a fact file will be maintained which will contain specifications, maps and photographs of all M-1 and M-2 property, including existing structures, in the city. The fact file will be kept current and used to attract additional industry to the community.

In making the announcement, Reeves said, "There is a definite and urgent need for a complete, up-to-date listing of all industrial buildings and sites. The ready availability of accurate and timely data will enable the committee to do a more effective job in dealing with industrial prospects."

"Further, the jobs that will be created through new industry will strengthen the city's economy and will provide a sounder tax base for Torrance," he added.

Two special subcommittees have been organized to conduct the survey. Serving on the industrial buildings committee are William R. Becker, Citizens National Bank, and M. G. Gardner, Bank of America.

The industrial lands committee will be comprised of William H. Greenawalt, Southern California Edison Co., and Reeves, Dominguez Water Corp.

Cooperating with and assisting both subcommittees will be the Torrance-Lomita Board of Realtors.

In order that the inventory be accelerated, Reeves asked all owners of industrial property, industrial realtors and developers, and other interested groups to furnish information on local industrial property to the Torrance Chamber of Commerce, 2204 Torrance Blvd.

**Sit-Ins
Slated to
Resume**

Sit-ins and picketing at the Southwood Riviera Royale tract are due to resume this week-end in the wake of charges and counter-charges by civil rights groups and Torrance developer Don Wilson.

Wilson announced at a press conference late Wednesday that he had rejected Negro attorney Odus Jackson's offer to buy a \$30,000 house in the all-white tract on grounds that Jackson was not financially qualified.

Jackson and his wife were in Torrance last night as guests of the Torrance Junior Chamber of Commerce, and Jackson, as the evening's speaker, told his side of the story and answered questions from the floor.

Jackson said he was easily able to qualify as a buyer and accused Wilson of subterfuge in failing to live up to his agreements with NAACP (National Assn. for Advancement of Colored People), UCR (United Civil Rights Committee) and CORE (Congress of Racial Equality).

Waiting at Bank
Jackson said he had tendered a \$500 deposit check Friday, July 12, to Wilson's sales manager, Gordon Harris, and had told Harris the check wouldn't be good until the following Tuesday as he had to transfer funds from another account. Jackson said a Wilson representative presented the check at 10 a. m. Monday, July 15, when the bank opened in Santa Monica, and that no further attempt was made either to cash the check or to contact him. The attorney said there had been sufficient funds in his account since July 15.

He also said he could easily obtain complete financing from several sources and he could arrange to pay Wilson cash in full for the house.

Jackson noted that the combined income of his wife and himself was in excess of \$1300 a month and that they were not heavy spenders.

Meanwhile Wilson reportedly accused Jackson of being a "pawn" of the NAACP and the UCR and charged Jackson did not really want to live in Torrance.

Jackson told the Junior Chamber he had been approached by several residents of the Southwood tract who indicated they would like to see him move in—if only to end the turmoil in the area. One resident, Jackson said, expressed the thought that the Jacksons would be good neighbors.

CORE at a meeting last night decided to resume its demonstrations on a full-scale basis. The group charged that Wilson had not lived up to his agreement of July 12 to sell to a Negro, to employ a Negro salesman in his tracts other than Centerville, and to advertise that he does not discriminate.

CORE said it had learned that the deposits on the remaining homes in the tract were put up either by Southwood residents or friends and associates of Wilson, and that it had sent Caucasian buyers into the tract, who were told homes were still available.

NAACP to Meet
NAACP is meeting Sunday to determine if it will join in further demonstrations against Wilson.

Jackson is undecided as to whether he will continue to attempt to buy a Southwood home.

Wilson was out of town last night, and The Press had been unable to contact him personally for a statement at any time Wednesday or Thursday. The developer did not notify The Press of his press conference nor did he send a news release to this paper, as he did to others. He did not return repeated phone calls from The Press. His secretary eventually on Thursday afternoon referred The Press to Wilson's press agent.
