Schnepf is bidding for the western regional tournament in 1965. The regional tournament is the level of play which precedes the World Series in Williamsport, Pa.

Schnepf served as tournament director for the recent California Section 6 series at Garrett Field and Mobil Field in Torrance.

In the feature game at 9:30 p.m. Manhattan Beach tangles with Hughes Aircraft of El Segundo.

Three Torrance teams are in the field. Torrance Blue meets Redondo Jaycees at 7 p.m. tonight, Tappa Keggas face South Mission AC at 12:15 p.m. tomorrow, and Torrance Gold meets Long Beach at 4:30 p.m. tomorrow.

Last week's Aquacade-Carnival-Open House event played to standing - room-only crowds at the Recreation Center and the Benstead Plunge, with an estimated 2,000 persons attending. Scheduled for the Recreation Center building this week are two especially entertaining events. The youth-drama summer stock workshops will present plays — two one-acts were performed on Aug. 14, and a three-act, "Ozma of Oz," is scheduled for Saturday at 2:30 p.m. Admission will be the request for a small donation — somewhere in the neighborhood of 50 cents.

On Aug. 25 the Torrance Park Bandshell will bring its "Music for A Summer Sunday," series to a close when it hosts a combined-city concert by the Fun Thru Music Bands, involving young musicians of elementary school age who have been enrolled in the summer program.

Tennis, Golf Tournaments
Sports activities continue through August, with tournaments in both golf and tennis scheduled for late in the month. Culminating the summer tennis program, the third annual junior tennis tournament will be held Aug. 26 through 30 on the South High courts. A novice tournament, Aug. 22 and 23, will sit new golfers against each other to determine the novice champion, and on Aug. 29 and 30 the Sea-Aire Teen-Age Golf Club will hold its annual championship match, with boys and girls divisions for ages nine through 18. Both of these events will be held on the Sea-Aire course.
