# La Leche League to Form Milk Bank

La Leche League group leaders from the Pasadena, Los Angeles and Redondo Beach chapters recently met with Dr. Benjamin Kagan at the Cedars of Lebanon Hospital to discuss the feasibility and possibility of a mothers' milk bank in Los Angeles.

In many cases, with desperately ill and pre-mature infants, breast milk has been the life saving factor according to Dr. Kagan. Although mothers' milk is available through the generosity of the league mothers, the group felt that a centrally organized collection, storage and dispensing unit is necessary to maintain any efficiency.

San Francisco is the only western city to have a milk

bank, it was pointed out and one local doctor on occasion has sent to Minneapolis for breast milk. The Children's Hospital in L.A. closed its bank in 1959. Dr. Kagan stated, There are only ten other milk banks in the United States in contrast to Europe where nearly every large city has one in operation, the doctor reported.

La Leche League, International is an organization of women interested in fostering better mothering through breast feeding, thus encouraging closer and happier family relationships.
