


'America on Ice' Show At Olympic

Midgets Set Holiday Card At Ascot

USAC midget auto racers are aiming at a goodly share of Labor Day holiday weekend paronage Saturday night at Ascot Park in Gardena. Racing director J. C. Agajanian has slated a full program at the 183rd and Vermont smokepath, capped by a 50-lap main. He hopes that the Offie chauffeurs will compete over the new "Perfect quarter" race course. Qualifying starts at 7 p.m., racing at 8:30 with a trophy dash for the four fastest cars. The old course was 234 ft. over a quarter-mile, so 117 ft. was taken off both straightaways and a new turn constructed at the south end. This side. The new smokepath, 50 ft. wide all the way around, will measure a true quarter-mile on the pole. Such favorites as Billy Cantrell of Anaheim, Johnny Moorehouse of Norwalk, Alan Heath of Northridge, Bullet Joe Garson of Eagle Rock, and the "younger generation" including Norm Hall of Hollywood, Colby Scroggins of Eagle Rock, Lowell Sachs of San Diego, Dick Weaver of Inglewood and many others are included in the field of some 44 drivers. 500 Junior Frogmen to Be Guests of Navy at Terminal

Five hundred Southland junior frogmen will be guests of the Navy at the sixth annual "Navy Day" at Terminal Island, all day Saturday in a program exposing the youths to underwater military practices, reports supervisor Burton W. Chace. The tour of the Long Beach Navy Base, sponsored by the county department of parks and recreation, will begin with a two-hour exploration of the shipyard at 9 a.m. Demonstrations involve a de-compression chamber and surface (hard hat) diving. Youths will then be taken aboard the submarine U.S.S. Roncador, a World War II craft currently being used as a reserve training vessel. The juniors will be luncheon guests of the Navy following the tour of the Roncador. The afternoon portion of

the Navy Day program will highlight under water and surface demonstrations by the Explosive Ordnance Demolition Unit No. 1, featuring the use of explosives and hand-held sonar devices. Concluding the program will be a visit aboard the carrier U.S.S. Yorktown. The Yorktown, named after its predecessor (sunk in Midway in 1942), saw service in Korea. It is an anti-submarine hunter-killer 897 feet in length, and capable of developing 150,000 horsepower.

Participating in the Navy Day are junior frogmen representing 31 county pools, the recreation and parks departments of 52 cities and the City of Los Angeles, YMCA's Boy and Girl Scout troops, and youth clubs throughout Southern California. Program coordinator Pete Manos, county parks aquatics specialist, states Navy Day is the largest underwater programs of the year for junior frogmen.


