Motorcycle Riders to Race On Two Weekend Programs

AMA motorcycle riders will have a busy Labor Day holiday weekend at Ascot Park in Gardena. Racing director J. C. Agajanian has scheduled the flat track races Friday night. On Sunday night the TT steeplechasers take over.

Leading the half-mile flat track handlebar twisters will be such stars as Elliott Schultz of South Gate, who had a startling rise into championship contention as a first year expert rider; current championship point

leader Sammy Tanner of Bellflower; and Stu Morley of Topanga, who is second to Tanner.

Amateur class riders are headed by Bud Waugh of Los Angeles and Guy Louis of Inglewood. Heading the novice riding brigade are Norm Elledge of Northridge; Swede Savage of Santa Barbara and Ivan Oden of Los Angeles.

TT steeplechase experts race over the rugged course with seven right and left turns plus a pump, over which riders are airborne up to 90 ft. Jack Simmons of Atesia and Skip Van Leeuwen of Lakewood are two-time main event winners over the TT course this season. Sid Payne of Bakersfield has scored three victories, while Clark White of Bakersfield has a single to his credit.

Qualifying for the flat trackers starts at 7 p.m., racing both nights starts at 8:15.

Ascot Park is located close to both the Harbor and San Diego freeways in Gardena.


