**11 LIVES SAVED ON HIGHWAYS; 'LIGHTS FOR LIFE' CREDITED**

Los Angeles County's "Lights on for Life" campaign over the long Labor Day weekend has been credited with saving 11 lives on crowded highways, Supervisor Kenneth Hahn announced today.

"The tragedy of 13 persons being killed in traffic in Los Angeles County during the 78-hour weekend cannot be discounted," Hahn said.

"However, the ratio of deaths on Los Angeles highways compared to the totals of the State (60) and nation (534) is very low," he said.

The supervisor, who sponsored the campaign through the Board of Supervisors for the third consecutive year, noted that 40 per cent of

the registered vehicles are in Los Angeles County.

On that ratio, 24 persons—not 13—would have died in Los Angeles traffic.

The California Highway Patrol conducted an all-out safety campaign over the Labor Day weekend in every County in California. However, Los Angeles County is the only one conducting the "Lights on for Life" campaign and can be credited with the lower ratio of deaths per registered vehicles.

Hahn praised the cooperation of the Sheriff's Department, news media and motorists in the successful campaign.

**SOCIAL SECURITY OFFICE OBSERVES ANNIVERSARY**

Miles Davis, district manager of the Social Security Office located at 1408 Crenshaw Blvd. in Torrance, announced today that the office will observe its first anniversary on September 10. The office opened for business on Sept. 10 in 1962. During the first year of operation Davis announced that over 5200 applications have been filed by, or on behalf of, persons entitled to Old-Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance Benefits. In addition to the processing of these applications, Davis stated that his office had issued 12,596 new and duplicate social security account number cards and had answered over 21,000 written, personal, and telephone inquiries from the public in the area served by the district office. At the present time there are over 26,000 residents of the South Bay area receiving approximately 1.7 million dollars monthly in benefits. Davis further

noted that most of the money is spent right here in the South Bay area for necessities such as food, rent, clothes and utilities. "We know for a fact that these checks are immediately cashed and are a tremendous stimulant to business," Davis added.

Most of the beneficiaries are 62 years of age or older but there are approximately 3200 minor children and adult disabled children who were disabled before age 18 who are getting benefits on the record of a deceased wage earner, many of whom may never have realized the social security tax which they paid as they worked would one day help their own children.

Survivors benefits are paid to widows, aged dependent parents and widowers. In many instances the social security benefits to individual families are the equivalent of a large estate

even though the deceased worker may have only a moderate income during his working life time.

In addition to monthly benefits a lump-sum death payment is made to the surviving widow or widower if the couple were living in the same household at the time of death. When no eligible spouse survives the deceased wage earner, the lump-sum benefit is paid to the person assuming responsibility for the burial expenses or directly to the funeral home.

Many of the 62-year-old people who elect to receive reduced benefits and retire before age 65 are continuing to work on a part-time basis or have accepted less demanding jobs at lower pay to supplement their social security benefit checks.

There are approximately 1600 disabled workers in the area served by the Torrance District Office receiving social security disability payment not only for themselves but also for their wives and minor children. These monthly benefit checks bring a sense of independence as well as security to the aged and disabled.




