## SWINGING DOWN A LANE

The big events are over for another year. I am speaking about the PBA Tournament with the top bowlers of the nation competing for the big pay off of \$2500. The pro-Am where amateur bowlers compete for first place with a Pro partner and \$500 top pay off. Last but not least our Junior Pro Open Bowling Classic of 1963 taking place for the first time this year.

In the big event I will not say walking away. I will say running away with the biggest margin of pins ever recorded in PBA tournament history. Young Billy Hardwick can take the well deserved congratulations he was receiving for his outstanding bowling achievement. He finished with 426 more total pins than his closest competitor which was Dick Weber.

Billy Hardwick has a great future ahead of him, most of you bowling fans know by now that Billy uses an unorthodox finger grip on his ball, he uses his index and middle finger instead of his ring finger, never the less it sure pays off. Try it some time.

The final standings in the PBA tour were as follows. Billy Hardwick, averaged 236 for forty games was out in front by 426 pins. Dick Weber second place, averaged 227, total 9,080; third place, Bill Bunetta, averaged 225, total 9,000; and Bill Tucker who was in there trying, his average 220, came in fourth place with a total of 8,800. Congratulations to you all.

The Pro-Am Tournament with pay off to amateur only was won by Don Hooper and Red Elkins, Don rolling a 641 series, adding his Pro partners score of 699 to win by four pins over second place winner Mike Deans, his Pro partner was Jack Henery, their total pin fall 1356. Third place, Ray Lundy, Pro Ev Collins, 1348, and fourth place H. Wright and B. Hardwick, 1339.

Don Carter "Mr. Bowling" himself was high in pin fall with a sensational 703 series, but his partner Jim Profit trying as he did finished up in sixth place with 1329. We congratulate these amateurs for their fine performance.

Last but not by any means least we come to the Junior Pro 1963 Open Bowling Classic sponsored by the National Fifty and Over Bowling Club. The boys were scheduled to bowl at 1:30 p.m. Thursday, but Mr. Harry

Golden the man who sees that every thing is just right for the PBA tour and Norm Belt, manager of Rose Lanes, decided that it would give the boys a better showing if they bowled along with the Pro-Am bowlers. It worked out just fine. The boys afternoon was not wasted due to Norm Belt, the ten junior's had the pleasure of having lunch with Dick Weber, Tom Hennessey, John Meyer and Ed Bourdase. Ed is not only a top bowler he is also quite an entertainer, the boys left the table with laughter in their hearts, and some sound advice from these, not only top bowlers, but fine gentlemen as well.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank Don Carter, Dick Weber and Billy Welu for their co-operation in having their pictures taken with our Junior bowlers.

The ten boys finishing in the finals received beautiful trophies. The first place winners in class A and B Division received larger trophies. These two winners are Class A, Bill Hambly, who rolled games of 233, 210, and 202 for a 645 scratch total. Bill has made the honor roll two years in succession, he is a fine student, he earns his own bowling money and bought his own bowling ball, had it drilled just the way he wanted it. If Bill choses bowling as his career he will no doubt be up there with the best. He had as his Pro partner Milt Molhusen, one of the top bowlers of the PBA tour. Total score 1262. First place in class B goes to Martin Parks winning over his nearest competition by just one pin. This young man is also a fine student and top young bowler. Milt Molhusen was Martins partner also, their total pin fall 1096. I think all the Pro bowlers who had the privilege of bowling with these Junior Bowlers will be talking about it for some time to come. The special Sportsmanship Essay Award was won by Russ McKeand.

The executive officers and the members of the National Fifty and Over Bowling Club would like to thank the officials of the PBA tour, Eddie Elias, executive director, who had the pleasure of meeting for a short time as he had to take a plane back to Akron, Ohio, Harry Golden, field representative and Norm Belt, for their wonderful co-operation in making this the first Pro Junior Open Bowling Classic such a big success.
