Appeal To Parents, Motorists On Child Protection Efforts

With tens of thousands of children returning to school for the new year, the Greater Los Angeles Chapter of the National Safety Council has issued a dual appeal to parents and motorists to intensify child protection efforts. In the appeal directed to parents, Chapter President J. T. Blalock said: "If your children walk to school work out with them the safest route and instill in every child the need to exercise caution in crossing streets. "If your children ride bicycles to school also determine the safest route and make certain that your children ride safely, obey traffic regulations and walk their bicycles across intersections. "If your children go to school by bus make certain they are at the bus stop on

time so that they will not have to run for the bus and possibly run into street traffic. Children should be taught to follow the safety instructions of the bus driver and his directions for leaving the bus safely." The safety council president urges parents who drive their children to school to make certain they are dropped off at a safe place which does not make it necessary for them to cross the street in the middle of the block. In the appeal to all motorists the safety council urged extra caution in the vicinity of schools. More than 2,500 school children age five to 14 are killed annually in accidents involving motor vehicles and more than 1,000 of these children are pedestrians.

Senior Citizens Recreation Area To Be Constructed at Alondra

A contract for construction of a Senior Citizens' Recreation Area at Alondra County Park near Torrance was awarded this week to the Vlier Contracting Co. of Studio City, announces Supervisor Kenneth Hahn. Vlier was the lowest of six bidders with a proposal of \$37,728. The Senior Citizens' Area will be constructed on the Manhattan Beach boulevard side of the park (near Prairie) between an existing baseball diamond and recreation building. Four horseshoe pits, four shuffleboard courts, a picnic area, and a sun shelter are included in the plans, Hahn said. A six-foot high concrete wall will enclose a portion of the area.

The sun shelter will be 16x39 feet and provide an area where senior citizens may relax and observe youngsters at play in the park. Alondra Park is located at 3612 W. Manhattan Beach Blvd. Its popular and varied facilities range from an 18-hole golf course to camp-out areas. A special recreation area and program for blind youngsters was recently established at the park. Construction of the Senior Citizens' Area will take approximately 90 days, Hahn said.




