

World Citizens' Salute To Be Held by Hadassah

South Bay Hadassah leaders will join with those of 14 chapters in a giant all-Southland "Salute to World Citizens" rally climaxing their 1963 membership campaign Wednesday, Sept. 25, at 1 p.m. in the Scottish Rite Auditorium, 4357 Wilshire Blvd.

They will unite with the Southern Pacific Coast Region campaign chairman, Mrs. Louis Katzman, and regional membership chairman, Mrs. Joseph Siegel, as well as Mrs. Oscar Lozanznick, regional president, in welcoming five recipients of Hadassah "Better World" awards to be presented at the meeting.

Heading the South Bay communities' delegation will be Mmes. Robert Breakstone, Palos Verdes Estates, president, and Nan Satton, Torrance, membership chairman. The South Bay chapter, founded only a few years ago, is one of the area's fast-

est-growing Hadassah organizations.

Hadassah "Better World" awards for contributions on various levels to the world community will be given to writer - dramatist Norman Corwin, Dr. George C. Griffith, noted USC cardiologist; TV-Radio Commentator William Winter; Mrs. Jack Karp, nationally noted Hadassah leader, and the family of the late Medgar W. Evers, Negro civil rights leader who was martyred last June in Jackson, Miss.

The culminating event of the "Join Hadassah for a Better World" drive occurs during Hadassah Week, proclaimed by Acting Los Angeles Mayor L. E. Timberlake and Gov. Edmund G. (Pat) Brown.

Besides the awards program, there will be a colorful entertainment and tour of the new Scottish Rite Auditorium.
