



'Hideaway Home' Models Premiere Showing Slated

Ray Watt, well-known Southland builder and president of the Ray Watt Construction Company, announced today a premiere showing of three furnished models of the "Hideaway Home" at 17799 South Western Avenue in Torrance.

Designed as a Balanced Power home, the "Hideaway" features a full line of modern gas appliances including forced-air heating, water heaters, and built-in ranges and ovens. The home has been selected for showing at the Los Angeles County Fair in Pomona under the co-sponsorship of the Southern California and Southern Counties Gas Companies.

Available in six different floor plans, the homes offer one, two, three, and four bedrooms and one or two

baths. Other attractive features are open-beamed ceilings and decorative vinyl tile flooring.

Pre-built by Aldgate Land Company, a Watt subsidiary, the compact "Hideaway Home" is designed and constructed so that it may be moved as a complete unit to the homebuyers lot. A variety of exterior architecture makes the one-and-two-story homes appropriate for mountain, desert, beach or city living. Prices range from \$8,850.

Representing a new concept in residential construction, the prebuilt home is distinguished from the prefabricated residence, in that the builder delivers the entire home, not just walls or roofs, to the owners' chosen location.

Civic Symphony Concert Coming to Torrance Sunday

A young Los Angeles artist, Ronald Romm, will be Trumpet Soloist in the coming Civic Symphony concert which will be given at Torrance High School Auditorium, 2200 Carson, next Sunday, Sept. 29 at 2:30 p.m.

Mr. Romm played as soloist with this orchestra when he was nine years of age. Since then he has played twice with this orchestra. He is now recognized among authorities as one of the finest talents Los Angeles has produced. He has played solo with the Long Beach Municipal Band, the Brass Society of USC for UCLA at Royce Hall, with Merenblum's orchestra, the Debut orchestra, and on radio and television. For two years he has been trumpet coach at Idlewild. He will play "Andante and Scherzo" by Barot and "A Trumpeter's Lullaby" by Leroy Anderson.

A noted British artist, John Ayre, will also be soloist in this concert, playing the lovely French Horn concerto by Mozart. Mr. Ayre was soloist and First Horn with the world-famous Halle orchestra and with the London Symphony Orchestra. He has made more than 20 recordings for RCA Victor and has been soloist on BBC and Radio Eirland. He, too, is a regular member of our Civic Symphony.

Civic Symphony Conductor, Elyse Ashle, has chosen a varied program for this, the opening of the season. Haydn's London Symphony in D major will open the program. It was produced in 1791 when Haydn visited London on the invitation of the concert manager Salomon. Rossini's "Barber of Seville" is also programmed. This overture had its premier in 1816.

Kamennoi Ostrow, often called "Russian Easter," which follows is really named after a favorite summer resort of the court of St. Petersburg, Russia. This is one of 24 "portraits" of guests whom Rubenstein met there. Music from Richard Rodgers' Carousel closes this popular program.

Navy Lieutenant Junior grade Jeffrey A. Carr, son of Mr. and Mrs. Hartley Carr of 1544 Marcelina Ave., Torrance, is serving aboard the guided missile frigate USS MacDonough, currently on a five-month tour of duty with the Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean.

MacDonough departed her homeport, Charleston, S.C. June 4, to join the Sixth Fleet as flagship of Commander Destroyer Squadron Six.

During her Mediterranean assignment the ship will visit ports in Spain, France and Italy.

Commissioned in November 1961 in Boston, Mass., MacDonough is among the Navy's newest guided missile frigates. She employs the Terrier anti-aircraft guided missile system and ASROC, the latest in anti-submarine missiles.

Emile A. Gayet, seaman apprentice, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Gayet of 3817 W. 173rd St., Torrance, serving aboard the guided missile frigate USS King which recently participated in a major fleet strike and anti-aircraft warfare exercise conducted by Commander First Fleet off the Pacific Coast.

Dubbed "Exercise Golf Ball" the five-day exercise centered around the attack aircraft carrier USS Oriskany.

In addition to the Oriskany, the task force included a heavy cruiser, two guided missile frigates, seven destroyers and three auxiliary ships, all of which are Pacific Fleet units.

Opposing the force was a submarine, a heavy "enemy" group consist-attack squadron, two carrier squadrons and a Canadian Air Force patrol squadron.

The "hostile" force was headed by Commander Naval Defense Force, Eastern Pacific.

A Pacific unit, King normally operates out of San Diego, Calif.

Harold K. Highley, aviation boatswain's mate third class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Champ C. Highley of 1002 W. 204th St., Torrance, recently reported for duty at the Naval Air Station, Norfolk, Va.

The primary mission of the air station is to support Atlantic Fleet operations by providing men and planes for the carriers of the fleet. Its numerous training squadrons and commands supply the fleet with well-trained and skilled aviation personnel.

In addition, Norfolk's air station is the site of a Military Air transportation Service (MATS) Terminal which has become a central landing and takeoff point for transport aircraft of all branches of the armed forces.
