





Chief Reminds Residents Of Fire Prevention Week

Battalion Chief Paul Schneider of the Los Angeles County Fire Department today reminded everyone that National Fire Prevention Week will be observed throughout the United States and Canada on October 6th through 12th. Schneider said that this is the 24th international observance of a "week" which began by simultaneous proclamations of the President of the United States and the Governor-General of Canada. "This week," the Chief explained, "marks the October 9 anniversary of the Great Fire of Chicago of 1871 and is used to arouse public interest in fire safety."

Chief Schneider said that we have an unfortunate habit of dismissing most fires as accidents, a sort of visitation of bad luck which somehow was unavoidable. But how unavoidable, or unpredictable, is the fire started by a carelessly discarded cigarette, or overloaded and defective electric wiring, or poorly maintained heating and cooking equipment? Chief Schneider explained that these and similar un-complicated causes are responsible for the great majority of fires.

We need to acknowledge the fact that fires are not only wasteful but avoidable, then go on to reform the habits and remove the hazards which cause them. When each of us as an individual has done this, we will no longer risk our lives, jobs and possessions to the destructive forces of fire.

Chief Schneider said, "Please be careful, not only in your home, but in our valuable watershed areas which are tinder dry due to our unprecedented drought this year." Remember, Fire Prevention Week is a good time to pledge yourself to the slogan, "Don't Give Fire a Place to Start."

LOCAL INDUSTRIES REQUEST SPECIAL BLOODMOBILE VISIT

Advantages of having a group account with the Red Cross blood program has resulted in a request for a special visit of the bloodmobile by a group of Torrance industries.

Twelve organizations will send their employees to the blood bank scheduled Monday at the Recreation Center, 3341 Torrance Blvd., from 12:30 to 5 p.m.

Mrs. Robert Orsini, blood program chairman for the Torrance-Lomita Red Cross branch, says the facility will be manned with Red Cross staff registered nurses and a doctor plus a crew of her regular volunteer nurses and aides who will assist in processing donors.

A goal of 165 pints has been set for the collection. "While it is true the people who donate the blood deserve the highest credit, special recognition must be given to the hard working blood chairmen in each company who recruits persons for bloodmobiles," Mrs. Orsini says.

She gives special praise to Patricia Fox, the plant nurse at Vernitrome who has done an "outstanding" job of recruiting.

Another equally as enthusiastic in promoting support for the blood bank has been Phillip Milich, personnel assistant at Magnovax who has signed up over 40 prospective donors.

Milich says the wife of a Magnovax employee will undergo open heart surgery Oct. 4 and Red Cross will supply the 20 plus pints of blood she will require.

"With our group account, the blood responsibility for replacing the blood does not exist for this family," Milich explains.

Several other specific cases for the need of blood by employees or their dependents has been pointed out by the company's who will be participating at the bloodmobile Thursday.

Among those lining up to give blood will be employees of C. P. Hall Co., CPR International Inc., Stanley Home Products, West Virginia Pulp and Paper Co., Kentile Floor, ABSCO Inc., White Front, Chicago Bridge, Marshall Laboratory, Reynolds Metal Magnovax and Vernitrome.
