

Tips for Parents Given for Halloween Season

It's that time of year again when children of all ages are called on to decide whether they want to be "scary," "pretty," "funny," or just plain "ugly."

While the deciding is going on, here are a few things to think about before you buy your child a Halloween costume. They come from Mrs. Evelyn MacDonald, consultant to the Collegeville Flag and Manufacturing Co., Collegeville, Pa.

Don't foist off on your child the Halloween costume you didn't have when you were young. You may have been the "ghost" or "skeleton" type. He may be scared to death of both and prefer to be a rabbit or a pirate. The choice should be his.

This is of paramount importance considering that most "trick or treating" is done after dark. And even the most careful youngster may forget basic safety rules in the excitement of Halloween.

"This year we've expanded our 'White-for-Night' costume line and developed a new glitter process for this very reason," Mrs. MacDonald says. All costumes were designed according to recommendations of the National Safety Council.

Remember manufacturers build safety features into their costumes — flame retardant fabrics, easy to spot colors, wide-eyed masks. Homemade costumes may prove to be false economy.

Remember you're not dressing him to be presented at court. No matter what it says on the label, buy the costume so that it's roomy. Oct. 31, can be cold and no youngster wants to spoil the effect by wearing a heavy jacket over his costume. The costume should be big enough so he can wear it over his outside clothes.

Make sure any mask your child wears allows him plenty of "eye room." If the holes for his eyes are too small, his scope of vision will be limited dangerously. Try masks on yourself before buying.

Be especially careful in selecting color. Will the costume show up in the dark?
