Arcadia's 60th Anniversary will celebrate with a parade and rodeo through Oct. 27.

The 31st Annual Barstow Mardi Gras will be held in this town on the scenic desert near Calico ghost town Oct. 31. Features include a night-time parade of bands, riders and floats decorated on the "Old Fashioned Mardi Gras" theme.

The Padua Hills Theatre will present "Gien Venidos a Mexico," a potpourri of songs and unusual dances of Old Mexico, through Nov. 9.

The Imperial Gem & Mineral Show will be held Nov. 2 and 3, Hollywood Park, Inglewood. Harness Racing will be held through Nov. 16. The Annual Allied Craftsman Exhibit will be held at the Art Center through Nov. 10, in LaJolla.

The La Jolla Halloween Celebration will be held Oct. 26. This resort invites school children to spend all day decorating downtown windows and then awards and prizes for the best decorations. Small fry have a Burning the Witch ceremony and a costume party.

Strolling musicians and top fashion models will be featured.

The Los Angeles County Museum will feature Fossil Freshwater Fish of Western America through Nov. 3. An exhibition of fossil fish from the Green River Formation, selected mainly from the prize collection of Robert L. Lynch, will be presented by the Vertebrate Paleontology Section of the Earth Sciences Division.

Featured at the same time in the Museum will be exhibit of plant specimens selected from the award-winning collection of Mr. George Schrader. The Schrader collection, made in 1880, was exhibited 80 years ago.

The Masterworks of Mexican Art will be featured in the museum through Jan. 1964. This is the largest and most comprehensive exhibition ever organized of the history of Mexican art covering over 3,000 years and containing over 2,000 objects.
