CANCER SOCIETY VOLUNTEERS TOUR PASADENA FOUNDATION

Part of the dramatic search for a cure to cancer was dramatically illustrated to Centinela Valley-South Bay American Cancer Society volunteers recently. Volunteer workers for the local Society District attended a tour of the Pasadena Foundation for Medical Research. Donald E. Rounds, Ph.D., director of the department of Cellular Biology at the Foundation, conducted the tour, explaining to the volunteers many of the research activities being performed by some of the world's leading scientists. "We believe that by learning more about the fundamental aspect of the individual cell we increase our chance of finding an eventual cure to cancer," Dr. Rounds stated. Local residents attending the tour included, Mrs. P. B. Marsh, District General Chairman of the Society's local office; Mrs. Lena Ziegler, Dressing Unit member; Mrs. Harold Olstad, Epidemiology Unit Leader; Mrs. Vance Basler, Epidemiology Researcher; Mrs. Lionel Sangster, District Service chairman; Mrs. Henry Fink, WALTERIA Residential Unit chairman; Mrs. Clifford Oviatt, WALTERIA Residential Section chairman; Mrs. William Bennet, district chairman of Office Volunteers; Mrs. George De Willipo, Lawndale Residential Section chairman; Mrs. C. E. Shackelford, Lay Speaker for the Society and Mr. Ron Cruger, District Public Information chairman. Many cancer inhibiting drugs were explained to the tour group along with some of the promising new treatments for cancer. A film was shown, depicting the phases of life that each individual cell undergoes. Over 700,000 feet of 16 millimeter film records are kept at the foundation. The American Cancer Society, by means of financial grants helps to support the work of the Pasadena Foundation for Medical Research.

LOCAL CLUBS CONTRIBUTE TO PARADE FLOAT FUND

Christmas Seal Drive Lags Behind Goal

A total of \$119,240 has been contributed to the annual Christmas Seal campaign thus far this year, Dr. Roscoe B. Bigler, president of the Tuberculosis and Health Association, reported today. Dr. Bigler said the figure represents the first week's contributions to the 57th annual drive of the pioneer voluntary health agency. The total to date is approximately 14 per cent of the campaign goal of \$875,000. He added for the comparable period in 1962, a total of \$137,660 had been contributed to Christmas Seals. The president of the voluntary health agency urged all residents of Los Angeles County to answer their Christmas Seal letter as soon as possible. He said funds contributed to Christmas Seals support year-round programs in education, research, rehabilitation and case detection. Families in Los Angeles County who have not yet received Christmas Seals may obtain them by calling the TB and Health Association at 483-3220. The Torrance Chamber of Commerce and the Torrance Junior Chamber of Commerce jointly sponsor the annual effort. Coordinating advisors to the association's committee are Orin P.
