Because of his busy holiday commitments overseas, Hope heretofore has not attended the party.

Lawrence Welk and artists from his television company will provide entertainment, along with the famed Cathedral Chapel Boys Choir under the direction of Mrs. Catherine Lewis, the inevitable clowns and other acts.

Santa Claus this year will be played by Richard L. Singer of Sun Valley.
