### Hook, Bait Key To Good Fishing

"If you can't hook a bait, you can't hook a fish." These words, uttered many years ago by a bewhiskered old cane-poler to his grandson, contain more than a grain of truth. For, while bait fishing is probably the least complicated way to load a stringer, the secret to success lies at the juncture of hook and bait.

**WORMS** — Run the hook lightly through the collar, using a single worm for trout and panfish, two worms for bass or walleye, and a whole gob similarly rigged for catfish.

**GRASSHOPPERS** — 'Hoppers, as well as such other terrestrial insects as beetles, crickets and caterpillars, should be tied to the hook. Fine thread will do the job and permit the bait to float in a lively, natural fashion.

**MINNOWS** — Hook should

be slipped under the skin just aft of the dorsal fin; best for still fishing and most casting. Sometimes hooking through both lips is advisable when making rapid retrieves or when using dead minnows.

**FROGS** — Tie the hook to back just behind the front legs or us a purchased bait sling.

**CRAWDADS, HELGRAMITES** — Hook either under the collar or through the tail. Keep bait moving, as each type is inclined to scurry under rocks and hide from the fish you wish to entice.

Choose hooks made of light wire and, depending on the bait used and fish sought, select the smallest size possible. Baits so hooked are injured only slightly and remain spry for longer periods.

Give the bait a chance. The fish will do the rest.


Heading the list of contests will be the officially recognized driving championship in Southern California. The winner will be invited to compete in the statewide championships later this year.

## Rams, Cowboys to Depend On Quick Scoring Punch

Explosive scoring power is the key to the Los Angeles Rams vs. Dallas Cowboys pro football opener in the Coliseum on Saturday night, Aug. 8, and both teams believe they have the ammunition.

The Rams have settled on strong-armed Roman Gabriel as their rifleman while the Cowboys are counting on Don Meredith to do the firing. The pitching, of course, is just part of the performance. Coach Tom Landry of Dallas figures he has the finest set of receivers in the National Football League, especially with the between season additions of Buddy Dial from the Steelers and Tommy McDonald from the Eagles. The club already had two standout catchers in Frank Clarke and Lee Folkins.

**THE RAMS** are also well stocked in the snagging department with such veterans as Red Phillips, Carroll Dale, Duane Allen and the 'find' late last season, tight end Marlin McKeever. That's not taking into account such speedsters as Jon Arnett and Dick Bass.

Although the Cowboys' main attack is geared to the aerial game, coach Landry can rely on two gifted ball carriers in Don Perkins and Amos Marsh. The pair have been shuffled in position this season. Perkins from half-back to full to take advantage of his quick start and Marsh from fullback to half-

**PERKINS** has been All-Pro the past two years while Marsh, starting his fourth season, was a 9.5 sprinter at Oregon State.

In the final analysis, however, the victory probably will be decided by the effectiveness of Gabriel and Meredith. Gabriel, the solidly built 6 ft. 4 in., 225-pounder from North Carolina State, has won first shot at the Ram QB spot

in his third year on the club. This will be the fifth year in pro ball for Meredith, who set all sorts of aerial marks while at SMU, including an NCAA record of 61 percent completions during his three years. He took over as the regular Dallas quarterback in the middle of last season and finished with a completion percentage of 53.9 on 310 passing attempts and a total of 2,381 yards.

## 'Olympic' Ducats Moving Quickly

A brisk advance ticket sale for the Sept. 12-13 Olympic Finals at the Coliseum has been reported by Bill Nicholas, chairman of the Southern California Olympic Committee.

Nickolas said reserved seats are on sale for \$10 for the two days and are currently being sold only at the Coliseum box office.

Although several of the U.S. Olympic Games hopefuls will compete in Europe before the final trials, spring star Bob Hayes will be among the missing. Hayes, who has been plagued by injuries and missed the recent U.S.-Russian meet, is taking it easy at home.

On Aug. 13-15 he returns to action at Kingston, Jamaica, where he will compete

with several other stars who have already qualified for the Los Angeles Olympic Finals. The ailing Hayes was unable to qualify.

Hayes was named as a starter for both the 100-and 200-meter Finals by the U.S. Olympic Committee. His is the only case, to date, in which the committee has acted.

The "world's fastest human" has a 9.1 mark in the century, 10.2 for the 100 meters and 20.4 at 200 meters.

George T. Eastment, chairman of the Olympic Committee, points out that his group has the right to name truly outstanding performers to the list of those already qualified for the Olympic Finals.

## Claimers Will Race At Ascot

Jalopy Derby will return to Ascot Park in Gardena this afternoon for a seven-event program over the Gardena quarter-mile oval.

The California Jalopy Association, now known as California Auto Racing, Inc., shed its identity recently because only one of its five racing divisions, the claimers, really qualified as jalopies.

The claimers will have the field all to themselves today in a program that will include a 4-lap trophy dash, four 8-lap heats, a 15-lap semi-main and a 25-lap feature.

The first race is scheduled for 2 p.m. with qualifying an hour earlier.

In last week's CAR super-modified program at Ascot, Jack Krogh made a sensational racing comeback. Krogh lost one of his arms in an auto racing accident five years ago, but came back last Sunday at Ascot to win a heat race and place second in the 50-lap open competition main event. He drove with the aid of an artificial limb, as does Allen Heath, another one-armed veteran.

## Torrance Clubs Due to Compete On Own Fields

The four Torrance Unified School District prep football teams will face nine rugged opponents during the 1964 season.

North and South high schools will each be playing four games at home and five away while Torrance and West have slated five contests home and four away. Included in the schedule are games as far away as Westminister, in Orange County.

Torrance High will tangle with both North and West while North will also meet South High.

For the first time in history, all four Torrance high schools will play home games in their own stadium. Athletic stadiums will be finished at South and West by September. Previously, only Torrance and North had football stadiums.

Two schools, South and Torrance, will be guided by new coaches in 1964. Ken Swift, a former assistant varsity coach at South Pasadena High, has taken over the reigns at South. John Trantham, former head coach at Campbell High in San Jose, will guide the Tartars. Bill Parton will return as head coach at West while Ed Levy will also be back at North.

Last year, North High came up with the finest record among Torrance gridgers. The Saxons swept to a second place finish in the Sky League, losing only to Leuzinger in the final game of the season.



## Football Tryouts To Begin

Pop Warner Football League tryouts will begin tomorrow and continue through Friday from 5 to 7 p.m. on the West High School practice field.

West High is located on the corner of Victor and Spencer streets, just north of Torrance Boulevard.

The Torrance Pop Warner Association, which has planned a 10-game schedule for each of the seven teams it will field, uses regular equipment and plays tackle football. Total cost of equipment ran to \$9,000. The group is entirely self-supporting.

Each of the seven Torrance teams will be composed of 33 boys. All games will be played at the West High Stadium.

The Association will field four teams in the Pee Wee Division, which includes boys from 10 to 12 years weighing 65 to 90 pounds. Two teams will compete in the Midget Division for boys 11 to 13 years weighing 85 to 110 pounds.
