Mrs. Anna Grancell, prominent philanthropist, has received a five-year plaque from Los Angeles Chapter of Hadassah for maintenance of a research bed in the \$25 million Hadassah - Hebrew University Medical Center near Jerusalem.

Participating in the ceremony, sponsored by the Hollywood Group of Hadassah, of which the donor is a long-time member, were Mmes. Joseph Heller, Westwood, and David Bassan, West Los Angeles, chapter president and founders' chairman, respectively.

At the same time Mrs. Ida Platt, group president, presented Mrs. Grancell a group life membership.

The 82-year-old philanthropist, a founding member and benefactor of Menorah Temple of Redondo Beach and honorary president of the California Home for the Aged at Reseda, has also contributed to Hebrew Union College, City of Hope, Cedars of Lebanon-Mount Sinai Hospitals, United Jewish Welfare, Sunair Foundation for Asthmatic Children and the Jewish Committee for Personal Services and its Gateways Hospital.

Over the years, as a triple founder and life member of Hadassah, she has aided its youth rescue program in Israel and many other projects—especially its famed medical center which helps to train specialists for the Jewish homeland and also the new countries of Asia and Africa.
