Red Cross Responds to Numerous Appeals

A typhoon in the Philippines, a cyclone in Pakistan and unsettled conditions in British Guiana have been among the international projects with which the American Red Cross has been involved this summer.

In a report just received by Torrance-Lomita Branch Red Cross chairman Stanley Heiman, details of the ARC aid to people in these different parts of the globe were related.

Responding to an appeal from the League of Red Cross Societies, the American Red Cross gave \$10,000 to its sister society in Pakistan following the June 12 cyclone which swept up the north Arabian Sea causing 400 deaths, leaving thousands homeless and destroying crops and livestock.

HALF OF the \$10,000 grant came from ARC disaster funds and half from the Children's Fund for use in aiding children who were disaster victims. An offer to provide medical and school supplies has also been made by the American Red Cross.

A contribution of 525 blankets to refugees from outlying areas to the capital city of Georgetown in British Guiana has been made by the American Red Cross. Foods regularly distributed through the Food for Peace program which the ARC conducts in British Guiana through the British Red Cross Branch there, were diverted for refugee relief.

During the coming year over five million pounds of food supplied by AID to the American Red Cross will be distributed in British Guiana alone.

HEIMAN SAYS Food for Peace programs are also conducted by the ARC in the Fiji Islands and Martinique.

To assist victims of typhoon Winnie which struck Manila and Central Luon in the Philippines on June 30, the ARC has donated \$10,000.

Described as the worst typhoon recorded there since 1881, the disaster caused the Philippine National Red Cross to go into immediate relief action. While an offer by the ARC to assist immediately following the disaster was declined, the Philippine society found that it could not meet all the needs from its own resources. The ARC donation will assist with the rehabilitation of 97,281 families left homeless by the typhoon.

SUMMER HAS also seen the completion of one phase of the relief program to victims of the disastrous earthquake which struck Skopje, Yugoslavia.

The ARC, as a member of the League of Red Cross Societies, assisted in a feeding program for 30,000 children for almost a year. When the children left Skopje at the end of the school year, June 03, the program ended and life is expected to have returned to normal when school resumes in the autumn.

Heiman point out, "Those of us who annually contribute to the Red Cross as we'll be called upon to do through the United Crusade fund

drive this fall, help give this aid."

According to the local spokesmen, each society, besides serving the people of its own country through health and welfare programs, assists others and cooperates in the protection of the victims of war, civil strife and disaster so long as the end in view is strictly humanitarian and divorced from political differences and ideological antagonism.

"We're all concerned with the relief of human suffering and because our American Red Cross is a member of the international family which is devoted to the welfare of all mankind, we as individuals have really been 'there' in the Philippines, in Pakistan, British Guiana and Yugoslavia this summer," Heiman says.
