World Missions Their Project

Victory CDA Court Aids Less Fortunate

Court Our Lady of Victory's active participation in the "world mission" phase, one of eleven points of the national Catholic Daughters of America program, shows remarkable productivity since its inception sixteen months ago.

Under the direction of co-chairmen, Mmes. Felix O'Reilly and Adrian Engel, the group meets but once a month; its specific aim is the preparations of bandages and hospital gowns for mission use; it is self-supporting. It derives its income from pennies through distribution of mission piggy banks. Membership is open to Court members and their friends interested in mission work with no further obligations.

During its initial year this small group has made outstanding material contributions to St. Thomas Aquinas Library in Sacramento, a central clearing house for world mission supplies; a \$25 donation to "Friends of the Lepers"—their pet project; and \$25 to "Meals for Millions."

The "Meals for Millions" program was developed at California Institute of Technology and is unique in that it is a direct and economical approach to the solution of the problem of starvation and malnutrition throughout the world. Made from soy beans, this multi-purpose food contains high protein, is rich in minerals and vitamins, has healing qualities as well, and costs an unbelievably low three cents a meal.

In material contributions the South Bay Court has prepared: 95 knitted leper bandages (3" x 9"); 163 hospital gowns made from discarded men's white shirts; 26 nurses uniforms; two doctor gowns; 19,926 feet of rolled bandages, and 14 coffee tins of cancelled commemorative postage stamps. Members have recorded 1,418 service hours to develop the above contributions.
