

School Bus Schedules Announced

School bus schedule for the Torrance Unified School District was announced this week by John Mock, director of transportation.

Students will be bussed to three of the district's four high schools and seven elementary schools, according to transportation attendance areas established by the school board.

Only variation from announced bus schedules will be on the day before school opens, when busses will carry freshmen to their schools for orientation. North and Torrance High students will be picked up beginning at 7:40 a.m. Tuesday, Sept. 15, while South High busses will begin pickups at 12:55 p.m. West High School attendance area has no sections qualified for transportation.

NEW TEACHERS

The Chances Are She's A Women

If there's a new teacher behind the desk in your child's classroom this fall, chances are she's a woman. Odds are 50-50 that she was born during World War II and is a graduate of a California college. And there's an even chance she's married. It's also a safe guess that she has taught before.

Vital statistics on Torrance's 185 new teachers were released this week by Dr. Robert Morton, assistant superintendent of personnel. With 132 new elementary and 53 new high school teachers joining the faculty this year, Torrance will have a total of 1,243 teachers and administrators handling an anticipated 32,658 students.

FIFTY-FIVE per cent of the new teachers have had professional teaching experience elsewhere.

Of the 90 or so newcomers who were trained outside of California, the majority came from north central and north eastern colleges. Most of them came from large colleges.

Recruits from California campuses represent California State College at Long Beach, the various branches of the University of California, and the University of Southern California.

TRAINED AT colleges and universities from 30 states, the new teachers come from as far away as Lockhaven State College, Lockhaven, Pa. and Elmira College, Elmira, N.Y. One hails from California State College, California, Pa.

Overseas representation includes two teachers from England who have changed assignments with two Victor School teachers under the Fulbright teaching exchange program, as well as two teachers who taught in the Army Dependents' Schools in England last year, one teacher who has taught in Hol-

land and one who has taught in Italy.

Women outnumber the men nearly 3 to 1, with 135 members of the fair sex and 50 men in the group. Median age is about 24 years.

AMONG THE new high school teachers, English was the major subject of 15 newcomers. There were seven mathematics majors, seven physical education majors and three science majors in the group.

Of the 185 new teachers, five are former Torrance teachers who are being reinstated.

How does the district recruit new teachers? According to Dr. Morton, the best source is "referrals by our own Torrance teachers." In addition the personnel department interviews candidates at college placement sources in California colleges each spring and in a limited

MORE THAN 1,000 candidates are screened each year. What are the requirements to secure a teaching job in Torrance? "Strong academic preparation and successful teaching experience constitute two essential factors in teacher selection," Dr. Morton said.

"Successful student teacher experience would be required in lieu of actual experience in beginning teachers," he concluded.

Playground Supervisor Jobs Open

Job openings for noon-duty supervisors at Torrance schools have been announced by Dr. Robert Morton, assistant superintendent in charge of personnel.

Persons desiring to work during school lunch hours are asked to contact the principal of the school at which they wish to be employed.

Duties consist of supervision of children in cafeterias, lunch areas and playgrounds at lunchtime. Pay is \$2 per hour, and employment will begin Sept. 16.

Only requirement for the position is U. S. Citizenship.

Noon-hour supervisors were hired by the district for the first time last October in order to relieve teachers of lunchtime assignments.
