Lemonade Makes Great Summer Party Treat

Frozen concentrate for lemonade, canned or frozen fruit juice, sparkling ginger ale or soda, plus ice, combine to make mighty refreshing beverages for summer parties.

You'll enjoy serving delightful lemonade punch on many occasions. Keep the makings and the recipes handy. Mix the delicious drink for a big party or just enough for a small group.

SPARKLING LEMONADE PUNCH

- 4 (6-oz.) cans frozen concentrate for lemonade
- 2 (28-oz.) bottles sparkling water
- 2 (6-oz.) cans frozen orange juice
- 2 (28-oz.) bottles ginger ale
- 1 (6-oz.) can frozen pineapple juice
- Ice cubes or chunk of ice
- Cold water

Combine concentrate for lemonade and frozen juices with an equal amount of cold water. (Fill each can once to measure water.) Mix and keep well chilled. Chill sparkling water and ginger ale. When ready to serve, put ice cubes or chunk of ice into large punch bowl. Pour in other ingredients. Mix gently. (Makes 50 (4-oz.) servings.)

MARASCHINO LEMONADE PUNCH

- 3 (6-oz.) cans frozen concentrate for lemonade
 - 2 (28-oz.) bottles chilled ginger ale
 - 1 (12-oz.) bottle maraschino cherries
 - Ice cubes
- Combine concentrate for lemonade with juice from maraschino cherries. Chop cherries and add to lemonade. Mix with ginger ale and ice cubes in punch bowl. Serve at once. (Makes 20 (4-oz.) servings.)

ROSY LEMONADE PUNCH

- 4 (6-oz.) cans frozen concentrate for lemonade
 - 2 (28-oz.) bottles sparkling water
 - 4 cansful water
 - ale
 - 1 1/2 Cups loganberry or boysenberry juice
 - Ice cubes or chunk of ice
 - 2 (28-oz.) bottles sparkling water
- Combine concentrate for lemonade, water and loganberry juice. Keep well-chilled. When ready to serve, pour lemonade mixture, sparkling water and ginger ale over ice in punch bowl. Stir lightly to mix. (Makes 40 (4-oz.) servings.)

NECTAR-LEMONADE PUNCH

- 2 (6-oz.) cans frozen concentrate for lemonade
 - 2 cups apple juice
 - 2 (28-oz.) bottles sparkling water
 - 1 (12-oz.) can pear nectar
 - ling water
 - 1 (12-oz.) can peach nectar
 - Ice cubes
- Combine concentrate for lemonade with fruit nectars and apple juice. Ktep well chilled. When ready to serve, add sparkling water and pour over ice cubes in punch bowl. (Makes 26 (4-oz.) servings.)

Garden Checklist

1. Plant shade trees now. The late August sun should let you know where you need them. Specimen trees are available in containers at your local C.A.N. nursery. You can see what they look like in full leaf now.
2. Thin rank growth on grapes to admit light to the center of the vine.
3. Start planting stocks, snapdragons and other winter blooming bedding plants.
4. Plant citrus, avocado, and all evergreen fruits now while the weather is warm. All these are available now in containers, ready for planting.
5. Many Indica Azaleas are getting set for a fall bloom. Be sure to water them frequently and feed them this month with an acid fertilizer recommended by your C.A.N. nurseryman.

Single Call System for Emergency Aid Proposed

Supervisor Kenneth Hahn this week continued to press his campaign for the establishment of a emergency telephone number which could be dialed from any place in Los Angeles County for fire, police, and ambulance assistance.

"With the 76 cities in the County and the maze of jurisdictional boundaries, it is no wonder that the public becomes confused when trying to summon assistance by telephone," he stressed.

Hahn has suggested that a central dispatching service should be available from any telephone by dialing key letters such as H-E-L-P or A-I-D.

THE SUPERVISOR began his campaign for the vital services in 1961 in a letter to Gov. Edmund G. Brown, who put it under study by the State Fire Advisory Committee.

In 1963, at Hahn's urging, the Voluntary Intergovernmental Cooperative Fire Committee, composed of city, county, and communications industry representatives, began researching the problem.

County Fire Chief Keith Klinger reports the committee has been meeting regularly to determine the answer to the complex situation

which involves every jurisdiction in the County and the myriad of exchanges in the Pacific and General Telephone company systems.

"I KNOW this is not an easy problem to solve," Hahn said, "but it deserves all our efforts because it involves human lives and safety."

Hahn this week asked the Chief Administrative Officer to report forthwith on progress of the various committees studying the matter.

He suggested that Dr. William Pickering of the California Institute of Technology

be consulted. Dr. Pickering and his staff are responsible for the modern miracles of communication in the Ranger 7 and other space programs.

"WE LIVE in an era of great advancement in communications," Hahn observed. "We have Telstar, we have closed circuit Pay TV, and we have direct distance dialing to any place in the Nation."

"Certainly we can develop a system to eliminate confusion in reaching the proper emergency authorities when human life hangs in the balance of a few minutes."
