While officer Wallace was investigating, the dog took after him and he got in the police car just as the dog hit the door. Wallace said he rolled up the car's window to keep the animal from coming through the window.

A PASSING truck driver stopped his vehicle and walked towards the police car. Before officer Wallace could warn him, the boxer attacked and bit Fred Haptonstal, 25, of 24219 Ocean Ave., on the left knee. Wallace beat the dog off with his night stick and after each blow the dog would retreat a few yards and attack again. Wallace finally stunned the dog and chased him back into the yard.

Haptonstal and Wallace took refuge in the police car while the officer radioed and waited for another police unit and a unit from the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

Police said Haptonstal's injury was minor. The dog left red marks and apparently ruptured a blood vessel, they said.

**Council Upholds Firing of Garage Serviceman by City**

The firing of a city garage serviceman was upheld by the City Council, which reviewed the findings of the Civil Service Commission during a hour-and-a-half debate last night.

Milton K. Conn, who was dismissed on grounds of inability to perform his work and unsafe working habits in April, appealed his dismissal to the council, charging a lack of jurisdiction.

Attorney Milton L. Most, who represented Conn during the hearings, cited a charter provision requiring a Civil Service Commission hearing within 20 days of dismissal in his appeal, then went on to charge the grounds for dismissal were "discriminatory."

Councilmen accepted an opinion of City Attorney Stanley Remelmeyer regarding the jurisdiction, then voted 6-1 to uphold the Civil Service Commission. Mayor Albert Isen dissented.

Most indicated the matter would be taken to the courts in a law suit against the city.
