### Garden Checklist

1. September and October are good months to put in that new lawn. Do it right! It's just as easy! Ask your C.A.N. nurseryman and follow his instructions.
2. Ranunculus and anemone tubers are available for planting now. Soak them overnight before putting them in the ground.
3. Plant calendulas, stocks, and pansies for winter bloom.
4. Plant cyclamen in pots or in the ground for bloom through winter and well into spring.
5. Check your nursery for varieties of the early flowering Sasanqua Camellias. They start showing color in October.

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### Too Much? You'll Get A Refund

If you make a mistake and put too much money in a coin telephone, Pacific Telephone will return the overpayment to you.

About 500 people a day in Southern California make this mistake and appeal to the operator for a refund, according to local telephone manager J. P. Leggett.

"The overpayment isn't rightfully ours, so Pacific returns it to the customer," the manager said.

THREE departments are involved in the company's refund program. In addition to the cost of the paper work, it costs Pacific \$1.27 to return each dollar. The extra 27 cents is postage.

About 65 per cent of the returns are for 20 cents or less and it takes an average of four days for the refund request to be completely processed, the manager pointed out.

Because of the large number of visitors in Southern California, the refund mailings are not confined to this area, but find their way into mailboxes in every state and even in some foreign countries.

"SEVERAL months ago, Pacific returned 10 cents to a man who gave his home address at Beirut, Lebanon," Leggett said. "It cost 11 cents postage to return the dime!"

The annual refund figure is in excess of \$50,000. However, before each refund is finally approved it is carefully scrutinized.

"We're on the lookout for repeaters," the manager said.
