World Trade Expansion Topic for Voter League

"World Trade Expansion" will be the topic of a tape recorded address by Barbara Ward, noted British economist, at a series of meetings scheduled for next week at the homes of members of the Torrance League of Women Voters.

Miss Ward, in her address originally delivered before the national convention of the League of Women Voters last April in Pittsburgh, traces the development of world markets through history, propounds the need for financial management in global economy, and proposes a liberalizing of world tariff policies to assist the economies of newly developing nations.

national water resources is also slated for next week's meetings.
