## Lomita Leader Named For March of Dimes

Ethan R. Haslage of 2214 W. 243rd St. has been appointed Lomita chairman of the Los Angeles County March of Dimes by Eugene W. Biscailuz, retired Los Angeles County sheriff and March of Dimes general campaign chief.

Haslage is the former manager of the Lomita Chamber of Commerce. His first duties as head of the local 1965 March of Dimes campaign will be to supervise the recruitment of men, women, and teenagers to serve as volunteers for the January fund-raising drive.

The chairman pointed out that past local March of Dimes campaigns helped bring about the conquering of polio. Both the Salk and Sabin vaccines

were solely financed through the March of Dimes.

He outlined the organization's full-scale concentration on a program to fight birth defects.

"Here in Los Angeles County alone, at least 10,000 babies are born each year with a major defect, with over 700 deaths due to congenital malformations. One baby out of 16 will need special care", stated Haslage.

The March of Dimes supports a local birth defects treatment center for children as well as 43 additional birth defects centers located throughout the nation.

## Bagpipers Plan Band In Torrance

John F. Callahan, who has played with Fraser's Highlanders of Los Angeles, will conduct the meeting.




