League studies on local, state, and national governmental issues will be outlined by Mrs. Louis Lanzer, president of the non-partisan group. "We like to emphasize that there is a place in the League for all women with an interest in government, whether they have time to participate actively or are simply interested in

becoming better informed," Mrs. Lanzer stated. A summary of the "Know Your Town" study made by the Torrance League when it was founded less than three years ago will be presented by Mrs. Howard Foote, first vice president.
