

## LBJ Barbecue Event Planned At Saddle Club

## 'Africa in Transition' Talk Set

Dr. Edgar Love, for seven years a member of the instructional staff of the El Camino College social science division, will lecture at 11 a.m. Tuesday on "Africa in Transition."

All interested persons are invited to attend the lecture in Room 2 of the Commerce Building without charge. Dr. Albert S. Karr, chairman of the lecture series, said, Dr. Love's presentation will be the fourth in a current history and political science series.

Dr. Love received his doctor of philosophy degree from the University of Southern California, where his special field of study was focused upon Africa. He has traveled extensively in Europe, Africa, Mexico and the Philippines, has served in capacities which have given him a wealth of experience and background.

AMONG POSTS which have contributed to Dr. Love's first-hand knowledge of political science has been his service on the Pakistan Project of the University of Southern California. He has also served as an administrative assistant for the Department of the Army in Cairo and Manila. A year ago, he served with the Peace Corps Training Project, preparing volunteers for Peace Corps assignments in Senegal.

"Most recently," Dr. Karr observes, "Dr. Love has completed an extensive tour of Africa, where he was able to observe first-hand, the dramatic and interesting changes that are occurring."

During his visit to Africa, Dr. Love interviewed visa students from that continent who have taken government positions following their study at El Camino College as recently as last year.

## Many Events to Sparkle Fiesta

Street dancing, strolling musicians, folk dances and carnivals will be some of the highlights of the annual "Fishermen's Fiesta" at the Port of Los Angeles beginning Friday and continuing through next Sunday.

Climax of the fiesta will be the Sunday noon parade of the decorated fishing fleet, a seagoing Rose Parade featuring dozens of giant fishing boats decorated with water-lilies to crown's nest with flowers, pennants and elaborate animation. This year about 30 boats, ranging in size from 40 to 120 feet will "float" in the pageant.

Residents from every part of Southern California are invited to take part in the festival which is staged by the picturesque men of the nation's largest commercial fishing fleet.

Visitors can buy seafoods at the world's largest continuous fish fry—or from dozens of other booths featuring Italian, Slavonian, Mexican and other international fare.

THE COSMOPOLITAN atmosphere of the West's busiest seaport will be further highlighted with an International Dance Festival on Sunday afternoon.

Reigning over the event as Skipperette is 17-year-old Cathi Villich of San Pedro, member of a family associated with the tuna industry for more than 40 years.

Skipperette Mate Luana Madrid is the daughter of one of the Port of Los Angeles fishing fleet's chefs. Mate Suzanne Butler's father is employed in the canning industry.

California Governor Edmund G. Brown is honorary chairman of the 1964 fiesta and Los Angeles County Supervisor Burton W. Chace is honorary skipper.

Sponsored jointly by the City of Los Angeles, County of Los Angeles and Port of Los Angeles, the fiesta is a tribute to the harbor's fishing industry which last year produced a \$32 million harvest.

## Dills Flays Pilot, Backs 'Yes' on 17

Assemblyman Clayton A. Dills, D-Gardena, has endorsed a "Yes" vote on Proposition 17, the railroad anti-featherbedding initiative, "to bring California the benefits of the national railroad settlements worked out by Presidents Eisenhower, Kennedy and Johnson."

Dills, chairman of the Assembly Committee on Interstate Corporation, also lashed out at the "patently stupid statement of Arthur F. Gardner," an airline pilot, for "crude misuse of his office as president of the Los Angeles Board of Education in making a ridiculously false statement on Proposition 17."

TERMING Proposition 17 "a sound, sensible measure to bring California into conformity with national railroad settlements while protecting the job right of the individuals involved," Dills said "this measure will save California consumers \$12,000,000 a year and keep us competitive with other states not saddled with these outmoded featherbedding statutes."

Concerning Gardner, Dills said "the man either hasn't the vaguest idea of what he is talking about or is simply a dupe of people who do but don't care. As a pilot, if he doesn't know, he should know that there is no state law governing the number of men in a cockpit. Also, just as in the case of airplanes, Proposition 17 will place two men in the cabs of freight trains and take out the third man, the featherbedder."

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
