

Garden Checklist

1. Shop now for spring blooming bulbs especially ranunculus and anemone while the supply is good. You can set them out at your leisure, but buy while all varieties are available.
2. Disbud camellias which have set too many buds. It's best to do it now before the shrubs channel any more energy into excessive buds.
3. Plant blooming chrysanthemums to make up for lack of fall flower color in your garden.
4. Fall is an ideal time to plant native evergreens since the early winter rains will help get them established.
5. The Persimmon tree provides fruit for some of fall's most decorative table centerpieces. At the same time, the tree itself provides a bonus of big brilliant autumn foliage that turns to bronze and red. Gardeners who have not discovered this fine garden tree should get acquainted at their local C.A.N. nursery. The Persimmon fits neatly into small gardens and has few demands other than sufficient and good, rich soil.

Biggest Ever Harbor Fiesta Begins Friday

Torrance residents were issued a special invitation this week to take part in the Fishermen's Fiesta at the Port of Los Angeles next weekend. The annual Fiesta, one of the most photographed events in the United States, is expected to draw more than 300,000 persons. Activities get underway Friday and continue through Sunday.

"We hope a good many of the 300,000 persons expected to attend the Fiesta will come from Torrance," general chairman Harry Root said. He described the 1964 Fiesta as "the biggest event of the fall season in Southern California."

Principals To Attend Workshop

"Between 10 and 15 percent of all children show specific learning difficulties — mostly having to do with reading—which have nothing to do with lack of intelligence." So says Dr. Marianne Frostig, kickoff speaker at a series of reading workshops to be conducted for Torrance principals at the Educational Materials Building.

Scheduled to speak here at an administrative meeting Oct. 27, Dr. Frostig is director of the Marianne Frostig School of Educational Therapy in Los Angeles, a non-profit research facility that provides educational, psychiatric and psychological services for children with learning difficulties.

Attributing some reading difficulties to a "disturbance in perceptual abilities," Dr. Frostig recently stated that correcting a visual perception problem requires 18 hours of special training on the part of the teacher.

"SOME CHILDREN with perceptual disabilities will overcome the handicap without any outside assistance, usually by the time they are about 12," she said. "Many of these," she added, "suffer emotional maladjustments, however, due to the fact that they lag behind other children their age."

The reading workshops are being conducted to familiarize Torrance principals with latest thinking by top educators on remedial reading techniques and programs, according to Mrs. Margaret Collin, curriculum consultant.

OTHER SPEAKERS will be: Dr. Charles M. Brown, director of the reading center at the University of Southern California who will speak Nov. 24; Dr. Jo Stanchfield of the Department of Education at Occidental College, sched-

uled for Jan. 26, and Mrs. Madeline C. Hunter, principal of the University Elementary School at UCLA, who is slated to speak Feb. 23.

Also included in the workshop series will be a meeting dealing with screening children for reading ability and one which will preview tape recordings used at a recent UCLA summer workshop.

Eight remedial reading centers opened in Torrance schools this fall to assist children two or more years behind in reading, Mrs. Collin said.
