


# Montgomery Hi Faces Rival

## Water Polo '4' Sticks Together

Three thousand hours is a long time to spend in a swimming pool together. That's the estimated number of hours Tom Denny, Dexter Kaytis, Brian McMahon and Tom Peters, members of the El Camino College water polo team, have spent together in the water during the past five years.

The four were starters on El Segundo High's CIF Championship water polo squad last year and are currently first stringers for the El Camino polo team.

Oldest of the quartet is Peters, 18-year-old guard and All-League, All-CIF, and All-American at El Segundo. He hopes to transfer to UCLA after completing his studies at El Camino.

Goalie McMahon lettered in swimming as well as polo at El Segundo. The Los Angeles native is a towering six-footer.

A veterinary major at El Camino, Denny is a Huntington Beach lifeguard when not in the pool or studying. He hopes to complete his studies at the University of California, Berkeley, after his El Camino stay.

Kaytis, a 6' 2" guard, collected four varsity letters from El Segundo, two in swimming and two in polo. A drafting major, Kaytis plans to continue his education at the University of Hawaii.

## Harbor Seeks Eighth Win At Glendale

Harbor College's Seahawks this Saturday night will engage in the biggest and most critical game of a season in which each weekly crisis has been surpassed by another one just a little more thrilling and a little more critical.

A win over the Glendale Vaqueros this Saturday night on Casey Field would extend the Seahawks' winning streak to eight straight, wrap up the Western State Conference title, maintain the Hawk's No. 3 national ranking and keep alive their hopes for a post season bowl appearance.

It is also no secret that it would be a most satisfying win for Coach Scrappy Rhea and his gridders. Two years ago in Harbor's first year in the WSC a great Glendale team racked up the Hawks 80-0. Rhea was assistant to Coach Joe Berry then. Last year as head man Rhea almost got his revenge. His Hawks were leading the Vaqueros until the fourth quarter when Glendale pulled away to a 24-8 victory that insured the league championship.

Saturday's game at Ventura was another of the Hawk's patented cardiac cliffhangers in which the Hawks had to come from behind to overcome a 13-0 Ventura lead at halftime. The deciding score, a four yard plunge by Ben Delbennes, came with less than two minutes to play.

## Metro Conference

### Warriors Play Bakersfield

While Long Beach is taking a vacation from Metropolitan Conference football, three other teams in close pursuit of the undefeated Vikings will be out to tighten up the conference race this Saturday night.

Long Beach leads the conference with a 4-0 record. Three others—Bakersfield, El Camino, and Cerritos—are all 2-1 and eager to see Long Beach stumble when the Vikings return to conference warfare in two weeks.

Top game on the schedule comes at El Camino, where the dangerous Warriors will entertain Bakersfield. Meanwhile, Cerritos hosts East Los Angeles and Santa Monica travels to Valley.

Outside the conference the No. 1 ranked Long Beach club will be primed to enhance its prestige against Grossmont.

Last week, Bakersfield ripped Valley, 61-25; Long Beach hammered East Los Angeles, 55-0; Cerritos downed Santa Monica 32-22; and El Camino edged stubborn San Diego Mesa, 27-22.

Favored El Camino had to battle back from the brink of

defeat against aroused Mesa. Mesa was leading 22-21 when Phil Pomeroy crashed over from the two-yard line to pull out the victory for the Warriors.

Meanwhile, Long Beach's Motley continues to keep a handy lead in the Metropolitan Conference scoring derby. To date the Viking flash has 10 touchdowns and 60 points. Mackey, his closest rival, has 38. Conrad is third with 36.

By winning, Long Beach ran its season record to 6-0 to remain, with Harbor College of the Western State Conference, one of the two remaining perfect record clubs in California.

Harbor scored 21 points in the final period at Ventura Saturday afternoon to defeat the Pirates, 29-21, and stay in contention for a bowl bid.

Seven Vikings scored against East Los Angeles, but Greg Barton, who didn't score at all, dominated the play. The Long Beach quarterback hurled five touchdown passes on plays that covered 44, 31, 25, 71, and 26 yards.

Marvin Motley and Ron Drake each caught two of Barton's bombs in the melee.

## Aviation High Next For Torrance Eleven

Mike Blankenship, star back for the Torrance Tartars, underwent surgery on his injured knee Tuesday and is out of action for the remainder of the season, it has been announced.

Blankenship injured his leg against West High last Friday night.

Torrance returns to the football front this Friday night at Aviation. The Falcons have failed to win in two league games.

Torrance is 1-1 after blank West, 13-0. The team's loss was against Lawndale two weeks ago, 38-6.

Aviation has been beaten by El Segundo, 31-0, and Lennox, 26-13.

Torrance Coach John Trantham will send a strong running backfield against the Falcons. He found his best scoring punch last week in the back combination of Jim

Crockett, Doug Kelsey, Greg Barrett and Brian Olson.

Trantham also has Roy Gilstrap at center, Bill Everett and Norman Drey at guard, Paul Newhouse and Doug Woodward at tackle, and Larry Languis and Barry Garribrant at end.

Ivan Pomasoff, a returning second string all-Pioneer League back, is Aviation's top offensive threat.

After the tormenting Lawndale High took from El Segundo last week, the Cardinals may take it out on West this Friday night when they clash at West Stadium.


Nobody imagined Lawndale could get beat after rolling undefeated through five games, but El Segundo stunned the Pioneer League favorites 7-6.

## Knights Battle Lasuen

Fermin Lasuen High School, perennial champion of the Camino Real League, and Bishop Montgomery High of Torrance, a Fermin rival, bump heads Friday night in the week's feature prep football game at El Camino stadium.

The game was scheduled for the giant-size El Camino arena a year ago to allow plenty of seating, but even then no one expected Montgomery would be in contention for the league pennant at this stage of the game, much less higher in the standings that mighty Fermin Lasuen.

Coach George Swade of Montgomery might lead one to believe this is just another football game, but considering the Knights of Montgomery have never beaten Fermin, a pretty good appetite has been building up over the years.

Montgomery has beaten a pair of Camino Real opponents which have yet to win this year, taking a little polish off its 2-0 record. The team has registered a 19-13 win over St. John Vianney and 19-6 over St. Monica's.

The only comparable opponent faced by both Montgomery and Fermin is St. John Vianney, a squad the Padres blanked last Saturday by a 9-0 score.

Probably the two strongest teams in the league are Crespi and St. Bernard's Vikings. Crespi beat the Vikes, 19-13, last weekend in what might prove to be the league decider.

But without looking beyond Fermin, Coach Swade claims the Montgomery Knights will take them one at a time. He says Fermin Lasuen is particularly tough because of its winning tradition.

The Padres have an experienced line and a set of fast backs, namely Dennis Trani, Phil Smyth and Art Saenz.

Montgomery will go into the game with Danny Graham at quarterback, Armand Lemieux and Mike Crosbie at the halves and Raymond Moreau at fullback.

The line has Rich Williams and Mike Leamy at end, Terry McGuire and Bernie Fox at tackle, Mike Wood and Bill Kristefek at guard and Bill Yurak at center.

Backing the team on defense are End John Pleick, Back Ed Gillis, Tom Hanson at the defensive corner, Gary Nesenson at safety, and Lou Saldana.

St. Bernard's will have an easier evening, meeting St. Monica's, and Crespi takes on St. John Vianney.

## South Runs Second at Mount SAC

With Wes Fox and Lenny Jay finishing first and second the Spartans of South High took second place in the Mount San Antonio College Invitational Meet Saturday, Oct. 31.

Fox and Jay covered the tough Mount San Antonio course in the excellent time of 10:34 and 10:35 respectively. Mike Mooring (11:12), Jeff Marsee (11:25), and Russ Bell (11:31) combined to give the Spartans a total team time of 55:17. Westminister, the defending triple A Champs had a total team time of 54:19, beating South out of first place by the narrow margin of 1 minutes and 2 seconds.

The Spartan junior varsity and freshman teams made an excellent showing in the meet by both finishing third.

Th Mount San Antonio meet is run over one of the best courses in the country and is the largest meet west of the Mississippi. More than 3,000 boys competed in the meet on Saturday.

## Pop Warner Oilers Get Invite to Bowl

The Torrance Oilers, champion pee-wee Pop Warner football team, have been invited to participate in the Disneyland Bowl in Anaheim on Saturday, Nov. 28.

The announcement was made Sunday by Pop Warner Commissioner R. L. Schwanbeck.

The Oilers, unbeaten in seven games, ended the South Bay American League season Sunday with a 40-6 win over the Redondo Chargers. The team has three non-league tussles against El Monte Knights, Torrance Vikings

and Torrance Mustangs with which to get ready for the bowl game.

The Oilers are the third South Bay pee-wee team invited to the Disneyland Bowl since its inception five years ago. The Redondo Yellowjackets beat Camp Pendleton, 12-7, in 1959, and the Palos Verdes Lancers beat South San Gabriel in 1961, 21-0.

Four pee-wee and two mid-level teams will be represented in the 1964 Disneyland Bowl. Pairings have not been released, but games will be played at LaPalma Stadium.

Leading the Oilers to their seventh win against the Redondo Pirates Sunday was Rick Constantino who ran for three touchdowns of 50, 60 and 40 yards and tossed a 45 yard pass to Jerry Wallace.

In other pee-wee games the Torrance Mustangs beat its counterpart in the National League, the Torrance Vikings, 19-6.

The Hawthorne Bees, 12-6 winners over the Redondo Rams, and the Manhattan Beach Sharks, 14-0 victors over the Gardena Stars, remain tied for first in the Na-

tional League with 5-1 records. They will play it off, the winner to eventually play the Oilers for the South Bay title.

The Torrance Knights ended their American League season with a 20-6 loss to the Redondo Admirals.

In midweek games the Torrance Chargers upset the Redondo Rascals, 26-8, but the Torrance Steelers were beaten by the first place Gardena Bolts, 26-7.

The Torrance Bluedevils of the bantam division lost to the Hawthorne Stingers, 6-0.
