





A stepped-up program of leadership training and recruitment was announced by Ed Escovar. David Moline has been elected chairman of the YWCA's program committee.

The new laws became effective Aug. 1—and the value of new building permits has steadily declined since then.

AMONG THE biggest permits issued in October were two valued at \$178,000 each. They call for the construction of 36 apartment units at 3702 and 3712 Del Amo Boulevard. Other permits issued in October were: Torrance-Lomita Board of Realtors, a \$6,000 addition to board of offices at 22833 Arlington Ave.; Anchor Investment, Inc., a \$96,000 11-store retail center in the 23800 block of Crenshaw Boulevard; Christ the King Lutheran Church, a \$118,000 sanctuary; and Little Company of Mary Hospital, \$91,600 for a convent and chapel.
