County Trains Welfare Recipients in New Skills

More than 100 persons receiving county welfare assistance are being trained in clerical, typing, and bookkeeping duties as part of an intensified Community Work and Training Program started in July by Supervisor Kenneth Hahn.

The supervisor pointed out the training, in cooperation with the California Department of Employment, is expected to provide opportunity for welfare recipients to secure private employment because of the closeness of the agency to the labor market.

At present, there are more than 4,700 persons in the Community Work and Training Program assigned to various jobs for the benefit of the public.

These jobs range from park maintenance work to clerical duties.

The program of putting the skills of welfare recipients to work so they could become self-sufficient was started by Supervisor Hahn in a pilot project at General Hospital in which crews utilized to scrub down the halls and walls.

The success of that program prompted the supervisor to call for utilization of welfare recipients in every county department possible and to develop several projects.

Hahn reports that a total of 169, 861 man hours of work was performed by recipients during September, representing \$214,000 in terms of value of work performed for the county.

Most of the persons assigned to projects are receiving welfare payments under the Aid to Families with Dependent Children Unemployed program.
